



Our Black Hills Letter

DEADWOOD April 5th, '78. The anow is all gone, and I think it NEW STOCK OF SPRING is time we visit one of the strangest GOODS AT ALTHEN'S CLOTH- graveyards in the world. Although i is not yet two years since the first body was planted we have about three acres of them now, and only one or two head stones, the rest being marked with rough boards, and some with fancy wooden railings, and not a few with their epitaphs' written on the stumps that still remain in the ground. This is indeed the last resting place of a strange lot of people. Almost every profession and trade are represented here. Lying side by side are preachers and gamblers, doctors and miners, honest men and rogues. The first preacher that ever came to the hills was murdered by the Indians and rests here with nothing to mark the spot. Here almost side by side rest two young doctors one baving committed suicide the other dying with fever. Here in the same grave are the bodies of Samuel Curley, and his wife., better known as Kitty Leroy. Curley shot her through the

heart and then blew out his own brains. A good many graves are marked semething like the following. "Frank Miller, pistol shot." "Rudolfe Sweitzer, by accident in Senate Saloon." "Otto Tierbach, by pistol shet by his own hand." I also noticed the grave of Albert Wilde of Bay City, Mich. who was shot with a Sharp's rifle while mining on Boulder Creek. One of the fresh made graves is that of James McTreague shot while trying to jump a lot in Lead City. But probably the grave that attracts the most notice is that of Wild

Bill. I give you the full inscription on the slab at the head of the grave:
Wild Bill
Killed by the assisin
Jack McCall,
In Deadwood, Black Hills, Aug. 2, 1876.
