

The Stockholders of the K L & N. M. B. H. Resolve on a Change of Gauge. The Proposition of Mr. French of Var.

At an adjourned meeting of the K. L. & N. M. Railroad Co., held at company's office in Kalamazoo, Mich., on Friday, May 3d, 1878, the following report was made by

DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

OFFICE OF K. L. & N. M. R. R. Kalamazoo, May 3, 1878.
The directors of the Kalamazoo Lowell, & Northern Michigan Railroad Company beg leave to submit the following report to the stockhold

"The construction of a railroad from Kalamazoo to the Northeast through the County of Barry, by the the dividing line between the conn-ties of Ionia and Kent to Lowell, with a view ultimately, of extending the line into the pine forests north of Lowell, is a project which has long been favorably considered, and is one which will contribute very largetion of country through which it passes. So much interest was maned from people at all localities on the line likely to be benefited. Before attempting to make any arrang-ments for the construction of the road it was necessary first, to ascertain whether a favorable line could be obtained from Kalamazoo to Low-ell by the proposed route.
