State News.

Mining by means of compressed air power is now practiced in some of the Upper peninsula mines, notably the Republic.

John Dube, of Monroe, who was accidentally shot a few days ago, was buried in the morning on Saturday by the Monroe Light guard.

Three Methodist ministers in this State own printing materials, and take out a living by newspaper work in districts where their salaries will not support them.

A. C. Wilson, the gentleman who lifts 2,000 dead weight, lives at Reed City instead of Hay City. They talk of utilizing him for stump pulling next summer.

Bishop Gillespie has ordered a communion of five persons to meet in Niles at 6 o'clock p. m. on Wednesday next to investigate the rumor unfavorable to the character of Rev. Dr. McMurdy; L. L. D. the doctor having requested the same, and that his conduct on this matter will be more completely investigated.

Thos. G. Cockrell, who slept in a store in Ridge Prairie, Mo., in which he was clerk, was found murdered on the 1st, supposed by tramps. He was a nephew of U. S. Senator Cockrell.

Thirty-two Roman catholic priests and 28 nuns were attacked and died of yellow fever while administering to sick in the diocese of New Orleans Natchez, Vicksburg, Nashville and Mobile.

Two plasterers, M. Murphy and P. Connolly, fell from a swinging scaffold at the new Produce Exchange building Toledo, Ohio, Saturday, a distance of 80 feet. Connolly was instantly killed, and Murphy probably fatally injured.

A diary containing daily entries of the whole of Gen. Pope's campaign has been found by Gen. W. W. Dudley, of Richmond, Ind., among his old papers. It will settle many disputed points between the Fitz John Porter commission, to which Gen. Dudley has forwarded it.

A Chicago jury on Saturday found Jeremiah Kennedy guilty of murder for killing his wife last August, and fixed his punishment at death by hanging, but also said he had become insane since the murder. He will be sent to the insane asylum till sane, and will then be hanged.

The McKillop & Sprague commercial agency has dismissed its clerks and suspended operations at the same time notifying the clerks that their claims will be considered preferential. Suspension is owing to non-settlement with the estate of John G. Mappan, of Boston.

As the treasury regulations are such that a bona fide holder of registered bonds will find it difficult to obtain a receipt for them, the Manhattan Savings institution will not lose anything from the robbery of their bank on October 27, so far as the theft of this class of bonds goes—over \$2,000,000.

The total cost of the free delivery mail service in the 87 cities in which it was in operation last year was \$1,924,166 96, a decrease of \$96,452 89 from the cost of the same service for the preceding year, although the number of pieces handled was increased by 49,218,672. The average cost of handling this matter was 3c. per piece. The wages of the 2,275 carriers averaged \$700 07 each.
