



In many in-stances the "Cysts" are comparatively few and scattered and such meat may be prepared for food without the presbe prepared for food without the pres-ence of the parasite being observed. Butchers, sausage-makers and provision dealers are also liable to infect themselves by carcless handling of the fresh meat—placing between their lips the blade of the knife used in cutting it up, or taking food while at their work or immediately afterward, without wash-ing their hands. By such means they may easily, without knowing it introduce one or two small Cysticerei directly into the mouth or contaminate with them bread and other articles of food. 
