Editorial Comment.

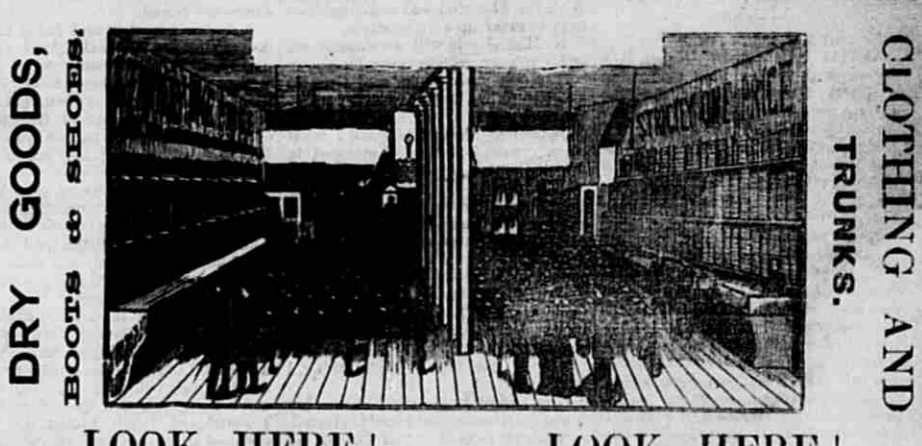
