A district meeting, annual or specis annot legally vote upon the wages to be paid teacher, and if such vote is taken, it must e considered as advisory and not binding apon the board. It is the exclusive right of he board to estimate the amount of taxe cessary to be raised for the support of the chool, to report the same to the supervisor

It is legal for a district board to make a contract with a teacher at a time previous to the annual meeting, and such contract will be valid and binding upon the district, provided the annual meeting does not vote for the employment of a teacher of a different sex from the one contracted with, or that school be maintained a shorter period (not less than the minimum prescribed by law) than is named in the contract. In case such action is taken by the annual meeting, it will render the contract void.


