That the West Indies, Bouth and Central America, the British North American colonies and the East Indies will like a boot text of free will be a supplying the supplyi will take about ten to fifteen millions of bushels, leaving a balance for the sup-ply of Europeau wants of 140 millions of bushels. Meanwhile there is left over

of bushels. Meanwhile there is left over from the crop of last year, a large amount of surplus wheat which may be reckoned equal to twenty-five millions of bushels that has to be added to the surplus of this year. If this statement approximates the actual condition of the wheat country, we have on hand a surplus of wheat equal to the whole estimated consumption of Great Britain including her own product and the foreign supply of one year! or an amount somewhere between 180 millions and 200 millions of bushels.
