FOREIGN.

The new ironeled turret ram Agamemnon, carrying four 38-ton rans and 8,498 toss burden, with engines of 6,000 horse power, was successfully launched at London Wednesday. A conside hie portion of the Irish harvest is irreparably lost. Potatoes have been partially blighted, and on many farms the whole crop is gone.

A dispatch from Cape Town brings news of the capture of King Cetewayo by Col. Barrow, on the 28th of August. Since it began the pursuit of Cetewayo has been continued without intermission. Some days before his capture he disbanded his followers and secreted himself in a bush. The kritish, under Col. Barrow, pursued him from kraal to kraal, burning Use kraals as Cetewayo and his constantly diminishing followers fied before them His capture was finally effected by surrounding him in a bush with a detachment of troops and threestening to shoot him if he refused to surrender at once. He was alone and made no resistance.
