In accordance with a resolution adopted at Grand Rapids, May 10, 1876, every county is entitled to one delegate for each 500 votes cast for governor at the last general election (in 1878), and one additional delegate for every fraction of 300 votes, but each organized county will be entitled to at least one delegate. Under a resolution of 1858 no delegate will be entitled to a seat who does not reside in the county he proposes to represent.



The English Grain Market.

London, Feb. 17.—The Mark Lane Express says: The weather for the past week has been accanoable. The rain was not excessive and plowing actively proceeded. It is still feared that some autumn sown wheat has been frosted as many fields where it should have apapeared are nearly bare, and on many where it has appeared it is neither strong nor forward. Threshing proceeded rather more freely, though the damp unfavorably affected grain, and the slight advance in price which has taken piace only applies to dry samples. Last season's crop was so deficient that already in some parts of the country the stocks of home grown wheat in farmers hands are almost exhausted. Foreign wheat arrived more freely both at London and Liverpool; nevertheless there has been a decidedly stronger feeling in foreign wheat, particularly isat Monday, when a brisk and healthy demand was experienced for all varieties at an advance of 6d to 1s per quarter on the week. This improvement was due to the legitimate effect of small imports, a diminution of stocks and the soknowledged scarcity of wheat in France.

Towards the close of the week there was a lack of animation, both at London and in the provinces, in consequence of the extreme demands of holders, but Monday's prices for red and white wheat were fully maintained. Maize on the spot, ewing to its extreme scarcity, improved alightly. Arrivals at ports of call have been very light. There was great firmness in the early part of the week, a large cargo of red winter fatching 87s for the continent. Fires in 1879.—During the past five years, according to the figures colcollected by the Insurance Chronicle, \$353,018,255 worth of property has been destroyed by fire in the United States. In 1875 the loss was \$78,102,285, in 1876 \$64,430,500, in 1877 \$68,265,800, in 1878 \$64,315,000 and in 1879 \$77,703.

The last year, it will be seen, was unlucky and only \$400,000 better than 1875, although in 1875 Virginia City, Nev., was visited by a blaze which swept away over \$6,000,000 worth of property. The losses to insurance companies last year were in excess of the losses of any of the four previous years. These losses amounted in 1875 to \$39,225,400, in 1876 to \$34,375,500, in 1877 to \$39,398,900, in 1878 to \$34,575,500 and in 1879 to \$44,464,700. During the five years there were 55,576 fires. Poorly constructed buildings, carelessiness on the part of occupants and incendiarism are the principal causes of fires. Am ing the several States New York leads in the figures. In 1876 her loss was \$14,000,000; in 1877, in 1877, \$11,455,490; in 1878, \$89,397,000, and in 1879.

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
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
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
