



Silkworm Culture.

About 60,000 silk worms are at work on the farm of Frank Graff, in Birmingham, Delaware county, Pa., and right lively, too, some of them being almost done and straw-colored cocoons are piling up thick and fast. The worms are being supervised by a Miss Hamilton, living at Mr. Graff's and she flatters herself that for her first attempt she is doing remarkably well.
