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

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

No boy or girl who really enjoy such novels as these can afward follow with satisfaction the sensational stories that make so large a part of novel literature. A taste for good reading, reading that is pure, instructive and entertaining, is a taste for good society. A boy with this taste carefully formed within him is fortified against the seductions that lie in wait for him at every turn. He is forewarned and





on the other pages. It is thought impolite to use a half sheet of paper in formal letters. As a matter of economy and convenience for business purposes, however, it is customary to have the card of the business man printed at the top of the sheet, and a single leaf is used.

In writing a letter, the answer to which is of more benefit to yourself than the person to whom you write, enclose a postage stamp for the reply.
