

Contracts Awarded. The state board of agriculture held a meeting at their room in the capitol on Wednesday, to consider proposals for the erection of the new library and museum building; also, for making additions to the chemical laboratory. Both contracts were awarded to Fuller & Wheeler of this city, at a cost for the first of \$20,720.40, and for the second of \$5,241. The proposals of the Lansing iron works for the making of four boilers and the setting of the same were accepted as \$2,250, on condition that they take the three boilers now in use. The bid of Andrew Harvey & Son of Detroit for underground piping to connect with the central boiler-house the two dormitories now heated by steam, the chemical laboratory, and the new library and museum building, together with the heating apparatus in the last named building, was accepted at an aggregate cost of \$4,642. The present library building when vacated will be assigned to the use of the agricultural department.-[Lansing Republican.
