The highway does not belong to the public, nor to stray cattle and hogs, but to the parties who own the adjacent land. The public has simply the right of way. No one in this state is under obligations to keep up a highway fence. A farmer can plant his crops to the very edge of the wagon track, and any one who unnecessarily tramples them down is liable to arrest for trespass.



occasionally. Your readers are many of them aware that Sheboygan means Wisconsin and that Cheboygan means Michigan,-this is from the former place. Our eyrie from which we write looks out upon about three acres of pine grove-preserved from the original forest on purpose for a Park. The city of 8,000 inhabitants has five extensive tanneries, and they also have three large breweries. The generous proprietors come around and treat all that will partake. It is said to be very healthy. Some of this class weave too, and we sometimes think they furnish some warp. There are three foundries here, one of them makes extensively porcelain lined hollow ware, the proprietor being the original inventor; three large chair factories,-the capacity of one being 1000 per day. The proprietor of another told us that they could make three chairs per minute or fifteen hundred per day. As a whole it is a beautiful, thriving, industrious city. The crops are all good through this county. The falls, five miles distant, has two large woolen mills and one or two large flouring mills etc. There is at present a great mortality among the fish in the river and ponds.
