EDITORIAL TALK.

-President Angell of the Michigan army. It is quite probable that Mason University, ex-minister to China and will be at liberty to spend Christmas chief of the commission which negotiated the last treaty with the "celestial" power, has been interviewed upon the vetoed anti Chinese bill, and has expressed an opinion that the time of suspension (20 years) was longer than the situation demanded. President Angell therefore thinks that President Arthur was justified in vetoing the bill. President Arthur objected to the bill because he looked upon it as a violation of a treaty obligation. This treaty obligation would be violated if the limit of time was fixed at ten years or even at five years. Mr Angell objects to the bill because the time for which Chinese immigration shall be suspended is longer than the situation demands. This implies that a shorter time provision would not be objectionable in the opinion of Mr. Angell.
