EDITORIAL TALK.

The retribution in that case come quick and sharp, and I know Thy divine law of retribution will strike this nation and my murderers in the same way. The diabolical spirit of this nation, its government and its newspapers toward me will justify Thee in cursing them, and I know that Thy divine law of retribution is inexorable. I therefore predict that this nation will go down in blood and that my murderers, from the executive to the hangman, will go to hell. Thy laws are mexorable. Oh, Thou Supreme Judge, woe unto the men that violate Thy laws. Only weeping and gnashing of teeth awaits them. The American press has a large bill to settle with the Righteous Father for their vindictiveness in this matter. Nothing but blood be on them and this nation and its officials. Arthur, the president, is a coward and an ingrate. His ingratitude to the man that made him and saved his party and land from overthrow has no parallel in history. But Thou, Right-eous Father, will judge him. Father, Thou knowest, but the world hath not known me, but now I go to Thee and the Savior without the slightest ill will towards a human being. 

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


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
