



The oldest bank notes are the "flying money" or "convenient money," first issued in China 2697 B. C. Originally these notes were issued by the treasury, but experience dictated a change to the system of banks under government in-spection and control. The early Chinese "greenbacks" were in all essentials similar to the movern bank notes, bearing the name of the bank, the date of issue, the number of the note, the signature of the official issuing it, indications of its value in figures, in words and in the pictorial representation of coins or heaps of coins equal in amount to its face value, and a notice of the pains and penalties for counterfeiting. Over and above all was a laconic exhortation to industry and thrift-"Produce all you can; spend with economy." The notes were printed in blue ink on paper made from the fibre of the mulberry tree. 
