### EDITORIAL TALK.

-F. M. Carroll, the irresponsible crank who runs that guerilla sheet called the Agricultural World, has at last received his just deserts-the emphatic condemnation of the people. He started out early in the campaign with a bitter and malicious attack upon the Republican candidate for Senator and willfully lied about him in every issue of the World up to the day of election. He first falsified our position on the question of foreign immigration by garbling and mutilating an article from our paper so as to change the meaning of that article entirely. This in journalistic cir. cles is regarded as the most disreputable, knavish piece of business a journalist is capable of. In less than two weeks this villainous work of his reacted upon him with such force as to make him suddenly drop the subject.

He then boldly asserted that the liquor dealers associations had endorsed us. This he knew to be a lie. We were not endorsed by any such association at any time and Mr. Carroll knew he was lying when he made that assertion. 


