-It is rather singular that so many people, including some newspaper men, too, do not understand that it requires more than a majority of each house of the state legislature to submit to a vote of the people an amendment to the state constitution. In several of our state exchanges received within the last two weeks the question has been asked: -"Why is it that the prohibitory amendment cannot be submitted? The legislature shows a Republican majority in each house and if the Republicans carry out the pledge in their platform of course the amendment must be submitted." "Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in the Senate or House of Representatives. If the same shall be agreed to by two-thirds of the members elected to each House, such amendment or amendments shall be entered on the journals respectively, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and the same shall be submitted to the electors at the next spring or autumn election thereafter, as the Legislature shall direct; and if a majority of electors qualified to vote for members of the Legislature, voting thereon, shall ratify and approve such amendment or amendments, the same shall become part of the Constitution."

Thus it will be seen that it takes a twothirds vote of each house, instead of a majority vote, to submit an amendment to a vote of the people. In the House there are 100 members, two-thirds of 100 being 67. The next House will have 61 Republicans-six less than the requisite two-thirds. In the Senate are 32 members, two thirds of 32 being 23 (you can't split a member). The next Senate will have 19 Republicans—three less than the requisite two-thirds. Now, assuming that every Republican member of each House will vote in favor of submitting the amendment in obedience to the instructions contained in the ninth plank of the Republican platform, it will be seen that the amendment cannot be submited unless it receives the support of at least six opposition votes in the House and three opposition votes in the Senate. Does this seem to be clear to our hitherto befogged contemporaries? It ought to.

- Mr. Reid, of the Allegan Gazette, has got 'em too-got 'em bad. He is anti-Ferry from the highest curly lock on his lofty head to the end of the biggest toe of his best foot. And he wants to know if "Mr. Hine isn't a Ferry adherent because Ferry gave him a post-office?" Bless Mr. Reid's dear heart the answer is No! Mr. Hine was a Ferry man years before Mr. H. got the postoffice, and when Mr. H. did get the post-office Mr. Ferry did not get it for him. If Mr. Reid knows half as much about the "appointing power" as he pretends to he knows that appointments of postmasters Grant and Mrs. Robertson. are generally made on the recommendation of members of Congress, and not by United States Senators. Mr. Hine never asked Senator Ferry for a political favor for himself in his life and Mr. Ferry nev er granted Mr. Hine a political favor in his life except to vote with other U. S. Senators confirming Mr. H.'s appointment as postmaster. Mr. Hine is under no special obligations to Senator Ferry, but he is under obligations to voice the sentiment of the people on the Senatorial question and proposes to do so regardless of what the disgruntled may say.
