

Wayne county, the most populous county in the state, with its 166,444 souls,(in 1880); with a total vote (in 1880) of 28,092, and with the vast amount of work done in the county by political prohibitionists in the interest of the Union party, turns, out only 15 persons to open a Union party county mass convention. We do not speak this derisively; we speak of it to show that the bulk of the temperance yote there as elsewhere is not in sympathy with the new party.


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

It is right to prohibit wrong. That is the way God does. The decalogue is a bill of prohibition and human law should be a rescript of God's law, in its spirit, or it is not law at all. It is only enactment. Law is not made; it is discovered. Legislation is discovering and applying law.

The liquor traffic, as a business, is wrong. It would seem to be a waste of time to argue this. Strong drink as a beverage is evil, only and continually. It is a destroyer of wealth.

See here. The people of this country pay annually for bread, \$505,000,000; for meat, \$303,000,000; for public education,\$\$5,000,000; but the sum of all three of these does not equal the annual liquor bill of this nation. Think of that! \$900,000,000 go out of the pockets of our American people, year by year, for liquor! Two-thirds of the interest bearing debt of the nation! If this could go to liquidate our national debt, we could square it all up in a year and a half.

Said Joseph Cook in one of his recent Boston lectures, "The liquor trade is becoming arrogant, defiant, rebellious, and this attitude will rouse the people to declare it an outlaw. Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad. And on this arogance of the liquor trade is founded my first hope, not for its regulation merely, but for its extinction." 




