TOBACCO. From the Detroit Post and Tribune.

Physicians tell us that tobacco is detrimental to the young, especially those of a nervous, sensitive organization. It has a tendency to retard the development of the body and mental force with which a young man commences the work of life, while its narcotic influences will ruin energy and palsy his strength at the very time when every faculty should be awake. Tobacco contains an active narcotic, so virulent a poison that a small portion being thrown into the circulation would cause death. Its effects vary with the habits and constitution of the individual. In many adults it seems to have no injurious effects, yet it seldom, if ever, does any special good. and all would undoubtedly be better without it. Tobacco was little known until after the discovery of America Since that time its cultivation has rapidly extended throughout all Europe and most of the Asiatic countries. The use of tobacco in the form of snuff soon followed its introduction. Shakespeare makes no mention of its use, but it is evident that it was well known in England in his time. It was confined to the wealthy on account of its high price, and smoked in very small pipes, probably the same which are known to antiquarians as elfin pipes; and the smoke was expelled by the nostrils instead of the mouth, in which way the narcotic power of the herb is much greater. Dr. Adam Clark remarks that so inseparable an attendant is drinking and smoking that in some places the same word expresses both. The late Governor Sullivan in speaking of the use of tobacco remarks that smoking excites a demand for a beverage of some kind to supply the waste of glandutar secretion, and ardent spirits seems to be the substitute, and the smoker is often reduced to a state of drunkenness and finishes life as such. The practice of smoking and chewing no doubt is a fruitful source of intemperance. 

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
