If these are left how annoying in gathering the fruit, besides you shake off so much good fru t in moving about, this loss if saved might turn the scale between profit and loss. A long handled chisel, ferules on end of handle, and mailet is a capital tool. You will want a saw also for large lombs which you should cut off tw ce and so avoid their splitting down. Have a little paint for the large limbs; it will save you from water sprouts. Get at it before the sap flows if you can but either prune or dig them out by the roots and raise some crop you like and can take

A good use for the brush is to fill n washouts; place them somewl atstraight, butts up hal; this will form a sort of drain, and silt will collect in the topsand fill up these annoying and unsightly p'aces one is sure to have more or lets nate as to have no such place, draw and pile in some field you intend to plow later in the season You can make a capital melon patch by burning them where you intend to plant. Whatever you do, don't be led to haul to the road fence and pile on top, or by the roadside, if you value your self respect, nothing looks more unsightly, and, like the road wood pile and barusion, knowing our Heavenly Father yard ought to be relegated to the past. We should try to recember this in 1885. There is a lesson taught in the Grange, that "Nature ever progresses." 
