The committee had not made a thorough canvass and were authorized to go ahead and solicit for the sale of more stock. The meeting adjourned subject to the call of the committee. Stockholders are liable only for the amount of their stock, except for labor performed. The Company is incorporated under the state law and the articles have been filed as required.
