River-Officials Troubled About Yellow Fever-Assorted Mishaps.

low Fever—Assorted Mishaps.

San Francisco, June 4.—An earthquake shock of considerable energy was felt throughout northern California and Western Nevada about 2 o'clock Thursday morning. At Genon the ground in one place shows cracks from one inch to one foot in width. Sacramento was noticeably shaken, many people being awakened. The shock was felt in the Yosemite valley and at Carson City, Virginia City, and Marysville.

One house near Genoa, Nov., after the earthquake was surrounded by cracks in the ground. Another stroke equally as heavy would have destroyed every brick house in the town.

In the Yosemite valley the force and duration of the shock were plainly felt.

At Carson City, Nev., pictures and plastering fell from walls. A large amount of plaster fell from the supreme court room in the capitol building.

Hot springs are reported dried up. Virginia City, Truckee, Marysville, Chico and Nevada City are a few of the many points affected by the shock.

COLUMIA, S. C., June 4.—An earthquake shock was felt here at 8:-5 a. m. Friday. The vibration-shated for half a minute. A milder shock followed the first in about three minutes. It is seven mouths since the great quake which shock up Charleston.

Patal Fall Down a Cliff.

Sr. PAUL, Minn. June 4.—Dr. Albert G. Brisbine met with an accident at Bridal Veil falls Sunday afternoon which resulted in his death Friday morning. Dr. Brisbine and his daugister drove from St. Paul to the falls, which are on the east sids, below the university. They left the carriage and began picking flowers. The doctor ventured too near the edge of the bluff and fell over. He rolled about thirty feet, when his progress was arrested, but he again lost his balance and fell thirty feet further. He did not think he was badly injured at the time, and reanaged to regain his carriage without assistance, and rode home. Tuesday Dr. Brisbine became very ill, and an examination showed that he had received dangerous internal injuries. Dr. Brisbine was a portly gentleman, weighing in the neighborhood of 275 pounds. He was 65 years old, and was one of the oldest actives and best-known physicians in St. Paul.

Kansas Crry, Mo., June 4.—A terrific electrical storm passed over this city Friday afternoon, lightning striking several houses. It is reported that a tornado swept over Liberty, Mo., but the wires are in such a condition that nothing definite can be learned at present. Lewis Huckett, a farmer living one, mile south of the city, was struck by lightning while standing in his doorway and instantly killed. The house and contents were entirely consumed by 8re. David Custer sought shelter for himself and horse from the storm under a tree about eight miles east of here. Lightning struck the tree, instantly killing both horse and rider.
