A HOLOCAUST AT HURLEY.

THE WISCONSIN TOWN AGAIN SWEPT BY FIERCE FLAMES.

Aleazar Theatre and Eleven People Are Roasted to Death-Others Injured by Jumping-Spread of the Flames-Action

HURLEY, Wis., July 11 .- Fire broke out on the stage of the Alcazar theatre at 8 o'clock Saturday, and within an hour the entire business part of the town was in flames, while eleven persons had perished in the theatre. The charred remains of nine people have been taken from the ruins. The Alcazar was a variety theatre, chiefly frequented by miners, and was one of the resorts of unsavory repute associated with the notorious dance houses of the mining regions.

Only a small audience had gathered when the fire broke out, and they scrambled out in a hurry. Several of the actors, however, rushed up-stairs to save their wardrobes, and when they sought to escape found that they never be known, as none of them except Sadie Wells and Mabel Powell, were ever seen again. Sadie Wells appeared at the second story window and called piteously upon the crowd outside to save her. Before a hand



d the flames reached her, and communicated to her clothing. She made a frantic effort to jump through the window, and then, with a piercing shriek, fell into the furnace below. Mabel Powell had reached a third-story window. She jumped, and was so badly injured that her recovery is doubt-

story window, and received serious injuries. She says she tried to force Miss Wells to leap from the window, but the latter delayed unit was too late. John Jarrett, stage carpenter, was badly burned and is not expected to

Lowell, Mich. Mabel Powell, Sadic known, also perished.

The Alcazar was in the very heart of the city. It was a mass of flames in a very short time. The fire seemed to leap from building to building until several blocks became roaring mass of flames. All efforts to get the fire under control seemed futile. The fire department, reinforced by scores of volunteers, sent its puny steams against the advancing walls of flame, but had to retreat as the fire swept ruthlessly on. It did not stop until material for it to feed upon was lack-

This fire, together with the one last week, destroys nearly all of the business portion of the town, leaving only a few stores standing. The buildings on both sides of Silver street and both sides of Copper street were burned for a distance of three blocks. The losses of this last fire aggregate \$450,000, on which there is but \$50,000 insurance. The losses of the two fires will aggregate nearly \$600,000. About 300 persons suffered from the conflagration, and many of them lost their all, being virtually homeless. A large number are

Collapse of a Sewing Machine Company. MILWAUKEE, July 8. - The Whitehill Sewing Machine company with a capital stock of \$500,000, has collapsed. The company was organized about seven years ago and built extensive works in the Kinnikinick valley. At one time they employed 300 men, but this force was cut down during the past two years, It is said the company has never made a cent. The officials say the liabilities will amount to about \$60,000, but it is believed they will reach \$2.0,000. The assets consist of the works and machinery, and a stock of sewing machines. Henry Fink, the president of the company, says the failure was caused by the

Provisions of the New Constitution of th Proposed State of Utah.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 8.—The "constitu tion of the state of Utah" was completed and adopted Thursday by the convention provides for the entire separation of church and state, non-sectarian education, no employment or rejection of school teachers on account of their faith, or non-belief in any doctrine or sect; forbidding bigamy and polygamy, and providing penalties therefor, which are not to be changed or amended without the consent of congress and the president, and no portion to go into effect except first indorsed by the president of the United States; apportioning representation as re-cently provided for the territory, so as to favor the minority, and other important sec tions, which were all adopted in their en tirety. The Utah commission will permit votes for the ratification or rejection of the constitution to be counted by the election judges at the general election Aug. I. Several of the Best Mines Sold-Over Four Millions Involved. MILWAUKEE, July 9.-Friday the sale

was consummated of several of the best mines on the Gogebic range, through Moore & Bengamen, who are also large stockholders, to the Lake Superior Consolidated Iron company, composed of New York capitalists, in-cluding ex-Secretary of the Treasury William Windom, Jesse Grant and Steve Dorsey. Windom has been in the city since Wednes day, representing the company in the purchase. The price paid for each mine was: Niminkon, \$480,000; Kakagon, \$680,000; Bessemer, \$480,000; Iron Chief, \$250,000; Bonnie, 8240,000; Moore, \$200,000; Atlantic, \$720,000; Prospect Hill, \$200,000. The price per share is slightly in advance over the quoted rate of stock, and the total purchase, including 5,000 acres of land and other properties, is \$4,500,0000. The new company will start in with \$1,000,000 cash in its treasury for operating expenses. 




