PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Aug. 2.-Hampton L. Carson, secretary constitutional centen-nial commission, received a letter from Governor Swineford, of Alaska territory, in which he says:



Augusta Gets Over Her Scare.

AUGUSTA, Ga., Aug. 2 .- Augusta has nar rowly escaped a great calamity. More than three fourths of the city was covered with water from one to six feet deep. The greatest damage is to streets and sewers, and no much to property in the city.
