





A HORROR AT HURLEY.

DISCOVERY OF A CASE LIKE THE BENDER MURDERS.

HURLEY, Wis, Oct. 8.—A most horrible discovery has been made in this town of myriad sensations. Seven men have been foully murdered. As has been telegraphed about the country on numerous occasions, Hurley is filled with dives of the houst lowest character. One of these haunts of infamy was situated upon the brink of a deep ravine just off the main street of the village. It was luckily burned in the big fire and was not rebuilt, and it was near the ruins that the terrible secret was disclosed, Monday two hunters took their guns and started out on a lookout for game. They

started out on a lookout for game. They chose this ravine to commence in, but be-fore they had gone very far on their way they suddenly missed one of their dogs, which for some reason turned home. At length they heard him giving vent to a prolonged series of howls, and hastened in the direction of the noise. Upon approach-ing the place their olfactory organs were saluted by a most horrible stench, so terrible that they retraced their steps. They kept whistling and calling to their dog, and at last he followed them, but bringing with him in his mouth a blood-stained and tattered silk cap such as is com-monly used by trainmen in summer. The monly used by trainmen in summer. The fact that there were some tufts of human hair adhering to the jagged rent in the cap, together with their dog's anxiety to return to the spot where he had found the ghastly relic, induced the hunters to trace the dreadful

induced the hunters to trace the dreadful odor and institute search. They went, and what a sight met their horror-stricken eyes! Right behind the old dance-house, under some rotten logs and a slight covering of earth, they saw the de-composed corpess of seven evidently mur-dered men. They lay just as their slayers had thrown them, some with gaping wounds, showing that they had fought hard for their lives, while others lay hud-died up as if their murderers had done their fiendish work while their victims lay in a drunken stupor. The hunters informed the proper authorities, and an investigation fol-lowed, but no clue could be found to the identity of the corpses, which were so de-composed as to be beyond recognition. The fiends that had placed them there had taken good care to rob them of everything. The remains of the seven men were buried in one grave.
