## A TALK TO THE KNIGHTS.

**MASTER WORKMAN POWDERLY DELIVERS HIS ANNUAL ADDRESS.**

He Defends His Administration Against the Attacks of the Anti-Powderly Men—His Views on the Chicago Anarchists—A Department of Labor at Washington Recommended—Convention Notes.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 7.—The whole of Thursday afternoon at the K. of L. general assembly was occupied by General Master Workman Powderly in delivering his annual address. He consumed four hours in the delivery and was frequently applauded.

He declared that members of the order who howled about the misconduct on the part of the officers of the order, instead of preferring their charges before the courts of the order, should be expelled and added that he had the history of a number of prominent knights who were guilty of this and would produce the same if it was wanted.

Recurring to the Anarchists again he said they had plotted to destroy the order and he had proof of this before him which was also at the service of the assembly.

Speaking of Socialism he said it should not be compounded with Anarchism, and stated that the K. of L. was founded on Socialistic principles and its constitution an exact outline of those principles, which he thoroughly endorsed. He recommended efforts to have bills passed by congress establishing a department of labor at Washington, and taking possession of the railroads, telegraphs and telephones of the country by the right of eminent domain; all of which he proposed should be put before the next session of congress.

In conclusion he said he had served the order as its head since 1879; that he was entitled to its confidence as its head; that the head of the order should always be thoroughly trusted by its members, whatever appearances were, and that if he was not so trusted, and the assembly desired to try another man, he waived his rights of another year's service, and asked them to select their man at this session. He would cheerfully make way for his successor.

The address was put into the hands of every delegate, and the assembly adjourned for the day.

The liveliest session of the assembly was held Monday afternoon. James E. Quinn, of District Assembly 49, New York, the famous "kicker" and Home club man, presented the following resolutions under suspension of the rules:

Considering that the development of the human mind in the Nineteenth century has reached a point expressed almost universally against capital punishment or taking of human life by judicial process as a relic of barbarism; therefore,

Resolved, That this convention express sorrow that the men in Chicago were doomed to death, and that it use every endeavor to secure the commutation of the sentence of death passed upon them.

The resolution was no sooner read than every delegate in the hall was on his feet. General Master Workman Powderly decided the resolution out of order. Joseph Evans, of Pittsburg, appealed from the decision. The appeal was lost by a vote of 151 to 52.

Before the appeal was taken Mr. Powderly called General Worthy Foreman Griffiths, of Chicago, to the chair, and in a short but vehement speech called upon the convention to defeat the resolution. He said no knight could be an Anarchist; he appealed to the delegates in impassioned words not to pervert the purposes of the order by the passage of any such resolutions. It was the boldest speech Powderly was ever known to make.

**HEAVY EXPRESS ROBBERY.**

**A Pacific Express Messenger Suspected of a Bold Stroke.**

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 11.—A safe of the Pacific Express company was robbed Sunday by an express messenger, and one report says the amount taken was \$22,000, and another says \$20,000. John Owen, a messenger of the company, did not show up at the office Monday morning and his run to Texarkana was given to another messenger. The robbery was discovered soon after and Owen is suspected. Search is being made for him.

**Lucky Pickup at Sea.**

GLoucester Mass., Oct. 8.—The schooner *Perseus* White, while off Cape Sable recently, picked up a large grayish mass which a expert in this city pronounced to be an albino. The specimen weighs 125 pounds and is worth \$30 an ounce, or \$30,000 in all.

**THE RECORD OF CRIME.**

The Merchants' and Miners' bank at Iron Mountain, Mich., closed its doors Saturday. It is reported the cashier has disappeared, taking \$15,000 of the bank's funds.

Two men robbed Jacob B. Gills, an aged and decrepit citizen of Kalamazoo, of \$85 Sunday morning. They broke down his door and by threats compelled him to tell where he had his money concealed.

Professor Albert A. Michelson, of Case School of Applied Science, at Cleveland, Ohio, had Ruth Whitfield and her aunt arrested Monday on a charge of blackmail. The women wanted back money for alleged liberties taken with Ruth.

Joseph Kneuser, a merchant tailor of St. Joseph, Mich., ended a spree Monday by committing suicide. He cut his throat, severed the veins in his arm, and then jumped out of a third-story window, fracturing his skull. He survived a few hours.

In the last three years and a half a negro porter employed by a jewelry manufacturing firm of New York city stole \$15,000 worth of goods from his employers.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 10.—A flurry was created here Sunday by an occurrence in the McKendree Methodist church. Rev. Dr. W. A. Chandler, the pastor, had delivered a bitter invective against the stage, in which he impugned the habits of many of its actresses.

Emma Abbott, the noted actress, was in the audience, and at the conclusion of the sermon arose and said that she had been on the stage since she was 8 years of age, and had always tried, conscientiously, and to the best of her ability, to do her duty before God at all times, and that she would defy any one in the whole world to say one word against her fair name.

There was a ripple of applause, after which Mr. Chandler said: "I will not undertake to reply to the lady, as she is a lady, but such a performance is more suited in the theatre than in the house of God."

**FATAL BLAZE AT CHICAGO.**

Man and Wife the Victim of the Conflagration.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—Fire Monday night damaged the fourth story of the building 510 State street to the extent of \$2,000. Richard Moore, aged 60, agent for a drug house, was found dead in one of the rooms, having evidently died from suffocation. His wife was literally roasted, and died on the way to the hospital. Several people were saved by being taken from windows by the firemen. The fire was caused by the overturning of a kerosene lamp.

**Jay Gould Gets the B. & O. Telegraph.**

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Jay Gould and Norvin Green said Thursday evening that the Western Union has bought the B. & O. Telegraph for \$5,000,000 in Western Union stock. They had elected the president, B. & O. officers to continue in their places for the present.

The form of purchase of the Baltimore & Ohio is a fifty year lease, but this is virtually a purchase outright. The \$5,000,000 W. U. stock at present prices represents \$3,500,000 cash.

**BUSINESS NOTES.**

The comptroller of the currency has issued a call for a report of the condition of the national banks at the close of business Oct. 5. Arizona is about to operate a dam, which its magnitude surpasses anything in the country. The reservoir will store 15,000,000 gallons of water for irrigating thousands of acres of placer and grazing lands.

There were 185 failures in the United States and twenty-seven in Canada during last week. Most of the business disasters in this country were reported from the west and south.

An assignment was made Friday morning by Ogden, Collier & Co., bankers at Troy, N. Y. The business of the firm included a savings department, and the total liabilities are estimated at \$500,000 or more.

A syndicate of Ohio and Eastern capitalists has purchased 68,000 acres of coal lands in Breathitt county, Kentucky, and organized a company with \$5,000,000 capital. Mines will at once be opened and roads built.

The business of the Chicago clearing house for the week ending Oct. 8 was as follows: Clearings, \$2,206,511.07; balances, \$5,270,277.49. The New York banks now hold only \$2,112,650 above the amount required by law. Their cash reserve during the last week decreased by \$904,850.

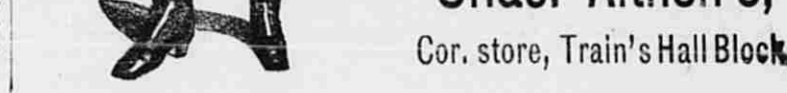
