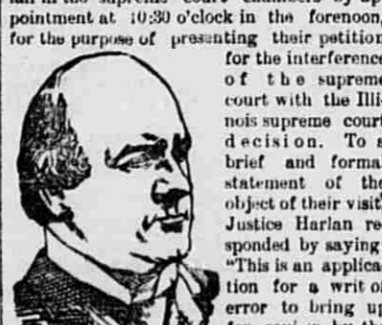

### PLEADING FOR THE REDS.

THE CASE NOW BEFORE THE UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT.

Unexpected Progress Made by the Counsel of the Condemned Chicago Anarchists—Gen. Roger A. Pryor Makes the Opening Argument Urging the Interference of the Court in His Clients' Behalf.

WASHINGTON CITY, Oct. 22.—Counsel for the Chicago Anarchists made unexpected progress Friday, and succeeded in bringing their case at once before the supreme court of the United States. They met Justice Harlan in the supreme court chambers by appointment at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of presenting their petition for the interference of the supreme court with the Illinois supreme court decision. To a brief and formal statement of the object of their visit, Justice Harlan responded by saying: "This is an application for a writ of error to bring up for review by the supreme court of the United States the judgment of the supreme court of the state of Illinois involving the liberty of one of the petitioners and the lives of the others. The time fixed for the execution of the sentence of death, I am informed, Nov. 11 next. Under the circumstances it is my duty to facilitate an early decision of any questions in the case of which the supreme court of the United States may properly take cognizance. If I should allow a writ of error it is quite probable that you would have to repeat before that court the argument which they propose now to make before me. On the



other hand if I should refuse the writ, the defendants would be at liberty to renew their application before any other justice of the supreme court, and as human life and liberty are involved, that justice might feel obliged, notwithstanding a previous refusal of the writ to look into the case and determine for himself whether a writ of error should be allowed. If he also refused, the defendants could take it to some other member of the court, and so on until each justice had been applied to, or until some justice granted the writ. In this way it is manifest that delays might occur that would be very embarrassing in view of the short time intervening between the day and date fixed for carrying into effect the judgment of the state court. As the case is of a very serious character in whatever aspect it may be regarded, I deem it proper to make an order that justice might feel which I now do, that counsel present the application to GEN. ROGER A. PRYOR, the court, in open session, to the end that early and final action may be had upon the question whether that court has jurisdiction to review the judgment in this case. There is no reason why it may not be presented to the court at its session to-day. Counsel may state that the application is made to the court pursuant to my direction."

The Anarchists' counsel held a short conference and decided to bring the matter to the attention of the court at once, and at just before noon, Capt. Black and Mr. Solomon of Chicago, Roger Pryor, Gen. B. F. Butler, and Randolph Tucker of Virginia, came into the court room and awaited the opening of the court. A few moments later Roger A. Pryor arose, presented the petition and began an argument urging the interference of the court on behalf of his clients.

The principal points embodied in the petition and the provisions of the law which were amplified and illustrated by Mr. Pryor in his argument are as follows: They challenge the validity of the Illinois law under which the Anarchist jury was selected and impeded, on the ground of repugnancy to the constitution of the United States; the decision of the Illinois state court is asserted as against the constitutional right of trial by an impartial jury; also that upon their trial the Anarchists were compelled by the state court to be witnesses against themselves, which is prohibited by the provisions of the United States. The Anarchists being all confined in jail when sentence was passed, were not allowed to be present, were not present, and so no opportunity was afforded them or their counsel to move in the supreme court of Illinois for an arrest of judgment before sentence was passed. Therefore they pray for a writ of error and reversal of the judgment and sentence of the Illinois supreme court.

At the conclusion of Mr. Pryor's argument, Chief Justice Waite asked him to furnish the court with those portions of the record showing that the points raised in this application were really in the record. This Mr. Pryor promised to do, and the chief justice told him the court would be ready to announce its decision in the matter next Thursday.

**Is Robert Garrett Non-Compos?** CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—The New York and Baltimore reports of the falling mind of Robert Garrett, late president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railway company, seem to be given some confirmation in the fact that the gentleman referred to passed through this city Monday in his private car, attended by two physicians, en route to Mexico. His wife was also with him. He stopped here an hour, but no one was permitted to see him.

**FIRES AND OTHER ACCIDENTS.** A defective switch was the cause of an accident to a fast express bound west on the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad Thursday, by which twenty-six passengers were more or less injured.

Engineer John Mathias was killed in an accident on the Washburn road near Missouri City, Mo., Sunday. C. N. Black, a postal clerk, was seriously injured.

Six boilers in the Lawrence Iron works at fronton, Ohio, exploded Monday morning, killing four men and wounding twenty others. The west portion of the mill was totally wrecked.

### CLOSING WORK OF THE KNIGHTS.

A Continuous Session for Nine Hours—What Was Accomplished.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 20.—Three days' work was crowded into one by the general assembly of the Knights of Labor Wednesday, and everybody was tired when, at the end of a continuous session of nine hours, the gavel fell and the convention was at an end. The adjournment was too late for the bulk of the delegates to catch the evening trains, but most of them got away by noon Thursday. The "administration" party is on the whole well satisfied with what has been accomplished, although considerable regret is expressed that it was not strong enough to bounce the discordant elements in the executive board and confer autocratic power upon the general master workman. The anti, on the other hand, while deriving some consolation from this particular victory, are brimful of dissatisfaction with the general outcome of the gathering, and unsparing in their criticisms of the treatment which they received at its hands.

Had it not been for the rigid enforcement of the three-minute speech rule, and the fact that no recess for dinner was permitted, the convention might have continued in session for an indefinite period, so numerous and important were the questions submitted. First there was a proposition from the committee on law to relieve the general executive board of all authority in connection with strikes, unless called upon to interfere by the district or national trades assembly involved, and this proposition was adopted. There was a brief debate upon a resolution prohibiting the carrying of any other but state and national colors in Knight of Labor parades. This was opposed by some of the Chicago, New York and Detroit delegates, but on a call of the roll it was adopted by a vote of 112 to 3.

A proposition was made to strike out that portion of the constitution relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors at social gatherings given under the auspices of the order, but the advocates of temperance had things their own way and the clause was allowed to stand by a vote of 104 to 49. The trouble with D. A. 126 was disposed of by leaving it with the executive board, with the statement that when the assembly complied with the law it would be reinstated, and the difficulty with the cigarmakers was straddled by a resolution that all who connected themselves expelled by the action at Richmond declaring that they must belong either to the knights or the Internationals, but could not belong to both, could be reinstated without fee. Contributions of locals to the co-operative fund were an optional instead of compulsory. The executive board were instructed to receive no charters for Chinese assemblies, because such reception would hurt the order in the west. The administration of Secretary Litchman was approved, and the strict economy enjoined upon the executive board.

The time of meeting of the general assembly was changed to the Tuesday following the second Monday in November; Indianapolis was chosen as the place for the next gathering; Tom O'Reilly, in accordance with established custom, sang, "If You Will, You Can Be Free"; the delegates joined in the refrain, and the convention was at an end.

**THE CHAMPIONSHIP SETTLED.** Detroit Wins Her Eighth Game and Takes the Honor.

BOSTON, Oct. 19.—The game on the base ball grounds here between the league and association champions Tuesday, resulted in a victory for Detroit, by a score of 9 to 3. It will be something remarkable if the St. Louis club can overcome the lead of their competitors with over half the series played.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 18.—St. Louis out-batted and outfielded Detroit again Wednesday, but nevertheless the league champions won by getting their few hits well together. King pitched an excellent game for the Browns, and succeeded in striking out nine of the heavy hitters. Conway also pitched effectively. Gleason's one-handed catch of a line fly, and Deacon White's great work on third, were the only particularly good pieces of fielding work. HOW TO REDUCE THE REVENUE.  
There was 114,000,000 pounds of wool imported into the United States last year, an immense increase upon the importations of previous years. In addition to this there was imported \$45,000,000 of woolen goods, and the duty on these goods was about \$2,000,000.

The treasury has no use for that wool. It helps to support the surplus. Why not stop it? The process is a very simple one. All that is necessary is to increase the rate of duty about 25 per cent, and this wool duty has been put on or can be manufactured in the country through a tariff duty that has proved a falsehood so often that it is hardly necessary to notice it. The only article the price of which is increased in the country is wool. It is such as we do not produce. Coffee, tea, and sugar are examples of goods whose value is increased by a custom duty. Yet Secretary Mann says that the duty on wool is not to be increased, and one ought to be placed on tea and coffee.
