DEFIANT TO THE DEATH.

PIES, PARSONS, ENGEL AND FISCHER

PAY THE GREAT PENALTY. Without a Tremor They Go to Their

Doom. and the Law's Supremacy Is Vindicated.

Parsons' fast Words Strangled in His Throat, While Engel Hurrahs for Anarrhy to the Last-The Tragedy Graphically Described.

An Incident of the Last Night -Terrible Emotion of Fielden-The "Marseillaise" in Jail Cell-No Clergyman Wanted-Bereaved Women Weeping Over Their Lost Ones-Mrs. Parsons Arrested and Released-The

CHICAGO, Nov. 12 .- August Spies, Adolph Vischer, George Engle, and A. R. Parsons, the four Anarchists who were tried a year ago and found guilty of the murder of Mathias A. Degan in the Haymarket square on May 4, 1896, were banged Friday in Cook county jail and paid the penalty of their and the four men died with words of defiance and seorn upon their lips. Parsons' last word was actually strangled in his throat by the hangman's noose. Seldom if ever have four men died more gamely and defiantly than the four who were strangled Friday.



Parsons. By So'clock they were all awake and ready for breakfast, of which they partook with fairly good appetite.

Dr. Bolton, a Methodist clergyman, visited them all during the morning, but they had no use for him, although they received him courteously. Parsons told him to remember that he did not send for him when he bid him good-bye. About 10 o'clock Fischer stood up at his cell door, and in a fairly good voice sang a couple of stauzas of the "Marsellaisa." The sheriff made his appearance shortly after, and read the death warrants to the

Now the hour approached when the tragic end was to be accomplished. The sheriff and his deputies appeared again and proceeded to array the men in their shrouds and pinion their arms. This was done quickly, and the roudemned were placed in Indian file and the march to death began.

There was a ruddy glow upon the rugged countenance of the old Anarchist, and when he ranged bimself alongside Fischer he raised himself to his full height, while his burly form seemed to expand with the feelings that form seemed to expand with the teelings that were within him. Last came Parsons. His face looked actually handsome, though it was very pale. When he stepped upon the gallows he turned partially sideways to the dangling noose and regarded it with a fixed,

stony gaze—one of mingled surprise and curicsity. Then he straightened himself un-der the fourth noose, and, as he did so, he turned bis big gray eyes upon the crowd be-low with such a look of awful reproach and sadness as could not fail to strike the inner-most chord of the hardest heart there. It was a look never to be forgotten. There was an expression almost of inspiration on the white, calm face, and the great, stony eyes seemed to burn into men's hearts and ask:
"What have I done?"

There they stood upon the scaffold, four white-robed figures with set, stoical faces, to which it would seem no influence could bring

And now a bailiff approached, and, seizing Spies' robe, passed a leathern strap around his ankles. In a moment they were closely pinioued together. Engel's legs were next strapped together, and when the official approached Fischer the latter straightened up his tail figure to its full beight and placed his ankles close together to facilitate the opera-tion. Spies was the last, but he was the first around whose neck the fatal cord was placed. One of the attendant bailiffs seized the noose in front of Spies and passed it deftly over the doomed man's head. It caught over his right ear, but Spies, with a shake of his head, cast it down around his neck, and then the bailiff tightened it till it touched the warm flesh, and carefully placed the noose seath the left ear.

when the officer approached Fischer threw back his head and bared his long, muscular throat by the movement. Fischer's neck was very long, and the noose nestled anugly around it. When it was tightened around his windrip: Fischer turned around to Spies and laughingly whispered something in Spies' ear. But the latter either did not hear him, or else was too much occupied with other floughts to pay attention. Engel other thoughts to pay attention. Engel smiled down at the crowd, and then turning to Deputy Peters, who guarded him, he smiled gratefully toward him, and whisp red omethor to the officer that seemed to affect him. For an instant there was a dead silence, and then a mournful, solemn voice sounded from behind the first right-hand mask, and cut the air like a wail of sorrow and waraing. Spics was speaking from behind his shroud. The words seemed to drop into the cold, silent air like pellets of fire. Here is what he said: "It is not meet that I should speak here, where my silence is more terrible than my utterances."

Then a deeper, stronger voice came out with a muffled, mysterious cadence from behind the white pall that hid the face of Fischer. He only spoke eight words: "This is the happiest moment of my life."

PROTECTING THE JAIL.

A State of Seige Maintained at the Place of Execution.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.-The strong guard of armed men that was thrown around the jail Thursday night was displaced Friday morning by a much stronger one. All passage along the streets bordering the jail was cut off and stout ropes were stretched across to mark the boundary line that travelers were permitted to approach. Capt. Hubbard commanded the men who



Clark street and guard-ed the buildings adja-cent to the jail. A rope was thrown across Michigan street at Clark and here six teen men armed with repeating rifles and revolvers guarded the entrance. The men who street did not carry

rifles. They were arm-INPECTOR BONFIELD, ed with revolvers and batons, both being carried in plain view. The houses and stairways in the neighbor bood were guarded by police and on the tops

of the buildings contiguous to the jail a com-pany of police were on duty.

From Clark street on Illinois and around the corner of the jail to the alley on Dear-born, Capt. Schaack, with over 100, men and Lieuts. Kipley and Larsen, protected all passages to the jail from the north side. These men were armed with the regulation Springfield rifla. On Illinois street passage was strictly forbidden. One hundred and sixty men were carefully stationed along the front of the jail. On the portico, in the windows, on the tops of the houses, in the cellars -everywhere was a strong guard ready to hallenge the least intruder who did not wear the uniform.

Thirty-five of the guards were armed with riot guns, each o' which would mow down a dozen men at a discharge. A lieutenant renarked that he had no fear of a rising at this time, but was apprehensive for Sunday.

Laid to rest, in a beautiful gar-den of the dead; beneath a mountain of fragrant flowers, amid the music of bands, solemn chants and passionate oratory, and the tears of thousands. Scarce less honors could have been paid the hero or patriot than were showered by their sympathizers upon



ies, Parsons, Engel, Fischer and Lingg. Sober thoughtful men who saw the great outpouring of people, who were confronted with the red emblems of the commune at every turn, who listened to the strains of the Marseillaise, asked of each other as to what it signified. Was it the last expiring gasp of the social revolution, or was it notice to Chicago and the United States, that "The King is dead long live the King?"

It was precisely noon when the band in front of the Spies residence on Bryson street front of the spies residence on Bryson street struck up a funeral dirge. This was the sig-nal for the starting of the head of the funeral procession. At the same moment the door opened the pall-bearers appeared. Twelve men holding large floral designs high in the air lined the space from the steps to the hears, and beneath this arch of flowers the offin was borne. Not only the street from ome end to the other, but the vast expanse of prairie on the other side, was packed with people, and when the casket with the covering of black cloth and heavy silver trim-



a low mean, broken only by the sobbing of women, went through the throng. Gently the casket was lifted into the hearse and cov ered with some of the floral offerings, while the others were placed on the top of the vehicle or fastened to the four stationary plumes at its corners. Then, the band sti giving forth its dirge, the procession moved. Behind the hearse were carriages containing the relatives of the dead man, the first being occupied by Mrs. Spies, his mother, Capt. Black and Nina Van Zandt. The latter was in the same costume that she had worn during her visits to the jail, and the trimmings of her jaunty hat, like Joseph's coat, were of many colors. There was a stolid look upon her face, but otherwise she mani-fested no sign of grief. Behind came the members of the Aurora Turn Verein and a elegation from the Bakers' union. All wore badges of blue and gold fringe.

At Fischer's house there was a short halt nd the second detachment, headed by the hearse that contained the remains, fell into line. The Gorman band struck up the "Marseillaise," many of the spectators joining in the chorus, and the now double funeral moved southward to Aurora Turner hall. Here the other sections of the procession with the remains of Parsons, Engel and

Lingg were in waiting.

There had been a pitiable scene at the late house of the former at the last moment. The widow was in a frenzy of grief. She threw herself upon the casket, and her moans and cries could be heard in the street below. "Oh. I can not live! I must die! I must die! My Goi what shall Ido?" she shrieked. "Pa, speak to me, speak to me only once "againf" The silver plate on Parsons' coffin bore the inscription "Albert R. Parsons, aged 39 Murdered by the state of Illinois, Nov. 11,

The funeral procession was now complete; and to the mournful music and drum taps of seven bands it slowly moved down town. No flags were carried and the only one seen dur ing the entire day, except a small United States flag whose appearance is noted below was the American standard which floated at half mast from Turner Hall. The process sion as viewed from the Lake street bridge comprised some 20,000 people. 
