SMALL RIOT AT A FIRE.

An Illinois City Marshal's Bad Example -Thirty-Four Buildings Burned.

CAIRO, Ill., Nov. 22.-At 10 o'clock Mon day morning fire broke out in a vacant frame building near the river front in Mound City, about eight miles from here. A strong wind carried the flames to an adjoining block and before the fire could be checked it had destroyed thirty-four buildings, including two hotels, two livery stables, four alcons, a printing office, the Old Fellows hall, a school house, and a number of residences. The Cairo fire department responded to a call for help, but was powerless to render aid on account of the lack of water in the immediate vicinity

of the fire. The loss is estimated at \$60,000 insurance, one-half, An incipient riot occurred between a lot of white men and negroes during the progress of the fire. The crowd freely appropriated the stock of one of the saloons, the city mar-shal imbibing with the rest. The latter started the row by unnecessarily using his club, and several fights followed in quick succession. Shots were fired and angry negroes rushed about with axes and weapons, threatening vengeance, but n serious damaga was done.












EDITOR:—In reply to your inquiry of Aug. 12th, would respectfully render you the following cogent reasons why this section possesses in re real and sub stantial advanta, es than the east in regard to ventures in the agricultural line. Permit me first to discuss the climatic features which a residence of over 15 years in this county (Richland) has made me familiar and therefore compe-

tent to weight.

In the first place during my entire residence here I have never known of any epidemic of any kind to have occurred here amongst man or beast, and died from old age is about the only cause to be assigned to the few who have left this mundane sphere of ours while residents of Dakota.

The atmosphere is very light and dry which accounts in a great measure why with the mercury at 30 degrees or 40 de grees below zero, we do not mind it half as much as we would ten or twelve degrees below zero in Montcolm Co. Michigan, where I formerly resided. The past winter which has been considered the most severe ever experienced in the U.S. did not block the roads but what a team could have gone to town, and only one day last winter were we with-out mail, white from newspaper ac-counts I gleaned that roads in the east were blocked two or three weeks at a

Another feature of this climate is the fact that a drouth no matter how protracted does not seem to affect the crops materially. Of course, no doubt, the soil is entitled to some credit on this score which goes to show that we are for-tunate over had and under foot. Before dropping this feature of my letter let me add that in my fliteen years re-sidence in this country I have only had occasion to call in a doctor once, an experience common to the most of my neighbors.

One of the most serious causes of the sudder shrinkage of cream during the dry weather of mid-summer was the fact that, with few exceptions, our patrons have relied wholly on pasture for their summer feed. We have noticed, however, that where patrons have had fodder corn to feed to their cows patrons have had fodder corn to feed to their cows in addition to the pasturage, the shrinkage in milk was much less perceptible. We believe it to be a necessary precaution for every patron to sow several acres of corn for fedder another spring. If the season should not prove sufficiently dry to necessitate summer feeding the sowed corn will make a very desirable fodder for whiter. For late fall and early spring pasturage, we believe rye to be very profitable.

One thing very essential to the success of the patron in his summer dairying is ice. Its use will in-sure, with the least possible trouble, the complete separation of all cream from the milk The ice should be broken and put into the tank BEFORE BULKING, so that when the milk is set in the water it may be as cold as possible. To secure the best remay be as cold as possible. To secure the best results, it is necessary to reduce the milk to the Low-est possible temperature in the Least possible time. Any patron will be well paid for the time and trouble it costs him to put up his fee in the winter and properly to apply it in the summer. Saving his time if he has to pump water, and saving his water when the hot, dry weather comes on. When a far-mer depends upon his windmill to fill his tank he in-variably wants fresh, cold water at night and morn-ing at milking time, when the wind has luiled and the pump will not work.

WINTER DAIRYING.

As our patrons will remember, it has been our intention to run our Creamery all through the year, but the withdrawal of the patronage of so many of our farmers has made this impossible this year. We might, could we have collected twice as much cream might, could we have conserved twice as much cream as we did the last six weeks, have made some money for our patrons and paid our expenses, but we must wait until more winter cows are kept or until more of the farmers decide to sell their cream, as the whole expense of running a Creamery charged to a small yield of butter makes the butter cost more than we are all it for than we can -il it for.
