MANY MILLIONS LOST.

The Cost of Strikes and Lock-Outs in the United States.

Nearly a Hundred Million Dollars Wasted in Labor Conflicts During the Past Six Years—Interesting Facts and Figures.

THE LABOR BUREAU.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Commissioner Carroll D. Wright has submitted to the Secretary of the Interior the third annual report of the Bureau of Labor, which relates entirely to strikes and lock-outs for the six years ending December 31, 1884.

In 1887, the report says, there were, according to the best information obtainable, 853 strikes, details of which are not available.

The report shows that during the six years covered by the investigation New York had the largest number of establishments affected.

In 2,182 establishments lock-outs were entered during the period named.

By lock-outs, 564 establishments, or 25 per cent of the whole, succeeded in gaining their points.
