Washington, Jan. 25.—After a long and important discussion in the Senate yesterday, the resolution to refer the President's message on the Pacific railroads to a special committee of seven Sepators (changed from five) was agreed to-yeas, 54; nays,

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 .- Among the bills introdu ed in the Senate Tuesday were the following: By Senator Call (Fla.), to prohibit subjects of foreign Governments from catching fish within three marine leagues of the coast or within any of the leagues of the coast or within any of the bays or headlands of the United States. Senasor Palmer (Mich.) addressed the Senate on his bill to regulate immigration. He disclaimed at the outset any intention to prevent any capable, honest, industri-ous, law-abiding person from seeking a home on American soil. If it was desired that the American workman should retain his superiority over the under-paid laborer of Europe such obstacles would have to be interposed from time to time as would de ter the influx of those who would degrade American labor by undue competition. Much had been done for the United States and for American laborers and artisans by the duties imposed on foreign manu-factured goods, but that very process had stimulated immigration; and that immigration, although in the main beneficent, now threatened, if continued without selection, to aggravate existing evils and to lower the standard of the American people by lowering the wages of those who toiled.

A GREAT STORM New York, Jan. 27.-Reports from New State and Canada state that a severe storm is raging. The snow s piled into mountalnous drifts, and travel on country roads is impossible. INTERNAL REVENUE TAXES.

Figures Showing the Amount Collected Since September 1, 1862. Great Storm in the New England WASHINGTON. Jan. 26 .- A communication and Middle States.

transmitted to the Senate Tuesday from the Commissioner of Internal Revenue shows that since the present system of internal revenue taxation went into effect September 1, 1862, down to June 3, 1887, the amount of tax collected on the spirits was \$1,099,379,980 and on the fermented liquors \$249,246,119. The production of distilled spirits during this time was 1,606,-865,194 gallons and of fermented liquors 269,719,782 barrels.

The total collections of internal revenue for the first six months of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1888, were \$62,443,608, an increase of \$4,940,104 over the corresponding period of last year. There was an increase on each of the principal objects of taxation as follows: On spirits, \$2,495,459; on tobacco, \$1,448,615; on fermented liquors, \$996,130, and on elemangarine, \$61,677. The total collections on oleomargarine for the six months of the present year were \$359,786. The collections from banks and bankers decreased \$2,645, and on misceilaneous objects \$59,

PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.

Views of Commissioner Colman Regard-ing Its Suppression. WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Commissioner Colman has written a letter to Senator Palmer, chairman of the Senate Agricultural Committee, regarding the suppression of pleuro-pneumonia. The Commissioner expresses the belief that the plan of State co-operation is preferable to the one which relies solely upon National authority, and says that the work of ex-tirpating pleuro-pneumonia, which is now being done by the bureau of animal industry, is going on smoothly, harmoniously and effectively by means of State co-oper-ation. He thinks that this work should be continued upon the same lines where it is now moving, and that it will be unfortu-nate and ill-advised if any new and untried


