SENATE. WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.-In the Senate yes-terday bills were introduced providing that all soldiers who served at least ninety days in the late war, and were honorably mustered out or discharged, shall receive the same out or discharged, shall receive the same bounty as if they had served their full terms of enlistment; granting a bounty of \$100 for each year's enlistment to seamen who en-listed in the navy between March 1, 1861, and March 5, 1863, and to amend the min-ing laws of the United States so that no more shall associate more than one minime ing laws of the United States so that ho person shall acquire more than one mining claim on the same vein.
