WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—The annual re-port of Pension Commissioner Biasck shows that during the fiscal year ending June 80, 1885, there were added to the pension rolls 60,755 new names (the largest annual la-crease in the history of the bureau), mak-ing a total of 425.257 pensioners on the rolls at the close of the year, classified as follows:
