General Ben Harrison Will Be th Next President.

THE LATEST BETURNS.

THE LATEST BETURNS.

The result of the National election has not been changed in effect by late returns, except that the addition of the electoral votes of West Virginia to the Republican column is indicated, the Republicans claiming to have carried the State for Harrison, to have captured the Legislature and to have elected all the Congressmen.

The late returns from the Congressional contests show that the Republicans have secured full control of the National Government, increasing their majority in the lower House. The Legislature of Delaware is Republican by 2 on joint ballot, which will result in the election of a Republican United States Senator to succeed Saulsbury and in the retirement of Secretary Bayard to private life for a time at least. If the Republicans of West Virginia have secured the Legislature of that State, as claimed, a Republican successor to Kenna will be chosen.

In the lower House of the present Con grees the strength of the parties is: Dem ocrats, 168: Republicans, 153; Independ ents, 4. The returns so far received indi ents, 4. The returns so far received indi-cate, granting doubtful districts to the Democrats, that the lower House of the Fifty-first Congress will stand: Republicans, 166; Democrats, 159; a Republican majority of 7. It seems likely that the Republican majority will be increased rather than diminished. Several Congressional dis-tricts are very closs and it may require an official count to determine who is elected in them.

Congressional districts. Score was dereated in the Eleventh by only 300 votes. In the General Assembly the Democrats have a majority on joint ballot of 21, of which 8 is in the Senate and 15 in the House. Their gain in Legislative representatives is 30.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—From the best informa-tion new at hand, it is estimated that the Re-publican majority in Illino's on the Presi-dential toket will run over 13,000. Fifer's majority is pat at 13,000, but it is doubtful if it reaches these figures. The entire State ticket is elected by handsome majorities, and the Congressional delegation will stand 15 Repub-licans to 5 Democrate.

MILWAUKER, Wis., Nov. 10.—The election returns from out the State are still very slow in coming in, and not more than half the countles have been heard from in full. On the figures already received Chairman Payne estimates that the State will give at least \$1,000 for Harrison, but Chairman Usher thinks it will not exceed \$1,000. There has been a great deal of surprise over the fact that W. D. Hoard, the Gubernatorial ganddate, has hor un ahead of Harr son, as he was expected to get a great many Democratic WISCONSIN. the fact that W. D. This is explained by the fact that the Prohibitionists cast a big vote for Harrison and then voted for their own Gubernatorial candidate. The later returns, however, indicate that Hoard will make up this less and fa an very close to Harrison and a good away ahead of a portion of the State taket. The Legislature will be overwhelmingly Republican. The Labor element has been entirely eliminated from the Assembly, but retains one representative in the Senate.
