Bayard Agrees to the Proposa for a Conference in Berlin.

BISMARCE'S PLAN ACCEPTED

WARRINGTON, Feb. 7.—Secretary Bayard has notified the German Minister at Washington that his Government accepts the proposition for a resumption at Berlin of the conference begun in Washington in 1887 in regard to Namoa.

It is thought that it will not be necessary to send a special commissioner to Berlin to represent this Government in the Bamoan conference, as the Un ted Btates Minister there can carry on the negotiations. If it should be deemed necessary to formulate a treaty between this country, England and Germany, a commission would probably have to be appointed.

Nob., Feb. 6—A high wind at 2 o'clock Monday aftersoon blew down a large section of the east wall of Max Meyers' brick building, at the corner of Farnam and Eleventh streats, recently gutted by fire, completely wrecking two buildings immediately to the east. Five people in the wrecked building were killed and several others more or less injured.

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 6—A heavy gale prevailed all over Nebraska Monday, starting at 2 a.m. at Alliance and reaching Lincoln at about 9 a.m. Considerable damage was done in the western part of the State, buildings boing funcofed and trees blown down. Alrapahoe a number of small buildings were blown down. Lincoln escaped with a few cornices blown as a few outbuildings overturned. The storm was an electrical disturbance, many watches and electric Hastings at 11 a.m. Monday, blowning sity miles an hour and wrecking the old News building and blew in the front of a two-story building on Hastings avenue. At 12:80 a 100-foot section of the sidewalk in front of the South ward public school building was blown 30 feet and Miss Aldrich and three children were buried under it. 




