RESTORED TO HER HOME.

Annie Redmond, the Little Girl Who was Kidnaped in Chicago Last May, was found at the Home for the Friendless in this city Thursday by a neighbor of Mrs. Redmond and restored to her mother. The father of the child became insane over the loss of his daughter. He was given permission Friday by the asylum authorities at Kankakee to return home. He was overjoyed at the recovery of his long-lost child and believed it will have the effect of restoring his reason.

The child was kidnaped by a Mrs. Gurley, the wife of a painter or printer. The treatment of the little girl by Gurley awakened the wrath of her mother and last January the child was taken from him and sent to the Home for the Friendless. Gurley was fired upon by the officers of the justice court and eventually allowed him to escape, since when nothing has been learned of his whereabouts.

CHICAGO, Feb. 11.—Joseph Gurley and her husband, Harvey, were arrested Saturday afternoon, charged with the abduction of Annie Redmond, and are both held prisoners.

DEATH IN A GALE.

Five Persons in Nebraska Lose Their Lives in Furious Storm.

Buildings Blown Down and Other Damage Done—Violence of the Wind in Kansas and Nebraska—Other News.

DEATH OF THE ELEMENTS.

OMAHA, Neb., Feb. 6.—A high wind at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon blew down a large section of the east wall of Max Meyer's brick building, at the corner of Farson and Eleventh streets, recently gutted by fire, completely wrecking two buildings immediately to the east. Five people in the wrecked building were killed and several others more or less injured.

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 6.—A heavy gale prevailed all over Nebraska Monday, starting at 3 a. m. and continuing through Lincoln at about 9 a. m. Considerable damage was done in the western part of the State, buildings being blown down. At Alliance and reaching Arapahoe a number of small buildings were blown down. Lincoln escaped with a few cornices blown away and a few outbuildings destroyed.

MICHIGAN STATE NEWS.

THE MINE FIRE.

The Extent of the Destruction Greater Than Was Anticipated.

Six mining camps went under ground in the Calumet mine the other evening. They found that the second shaft had extended downward fifteen hundred feet. The starting point, making the total depth of the shaft twenty-one hundred feet. This was a disappointing result for the management of the mine, but it is confident that it would not burn down at all. The experiment of letting the fire in the mine burn out had proved that the forcing down of water had saved the mine, but there was no possibility of finding the remains of the eight dead miners whose bodies were cut off when the fire broke out, as they must have been consumed.

Must Pay Duty.

The new customs order that Canadian built cars shall be prevented from crossing the line is strictly enforced.

Reports to the State Board of Health by fifty-four observers in different parts of the State for the week ended on the 2d indicated that tonsillitis, pneumonia, rheumatism, whooping-cough and diphtheria were increased, and intermittent fever decreased in area of prevalence. Diphtheria was reported in several places, scarlet fever at thirty-six, typhoid at eleven, measles at eight and small-pox at seven places.

Railroad Commissioner Rice issued a letter the other day urging the importance of clearing the way upon each side of the tracks of stumps and other obstructions to a distance that would render dangerous to the safety of the train.

The guano company owes about \$1,000,000, and Gilden & Curtis' liabilities are the principal creditors.

Next Night in Shooting.

New York, Feb. 9.—The coroner's jury in the case of the striking street-car employe McGowan, who was killed by Officer Snyder during an attack by the strikers on a street car, brought in verdict yesterday, charging the officer, the conductor and driver of the car for their heroic conduct in repelling the mob in the attack on the car and exonerated them from all blame.

Fire in a Convent.

THREE HALLS, Feb. 9.—Fire broke out at 6 o'clock Thursday morning in the kitchen at St. Mary's of the Woods, one of the leading Roman Catholic institutions for girls in the State. The fire did \$15,000 damage before it could be put under control, fire assistance being sent from this city, six miles distant.

Peace-Growers Despondent.

DENTON, Md., Feb. 9.—The present cold snap has deprived the peach-growers in this section of the State of their buds. Many of the trees are bare and the buds are in an orchard near here some of the trees are in full bloom. These the cold has killed, and it is feared that all the budding trees are also blighted.

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CAPITAL NEWS.

Work of the Nation's Law-Makers in the Fifteenth Congress.

Bills of Importance Introduced and Passed in Senate and House—The Indian Question—Other Notes of General Interest.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—In the Senate yesterday the House bill for establishing a Territory and Government in Oklahoma was presented and, after a lengthy discussion, was referred to the Committee on Territories. A joint resolution for payment of \$200,000 to the beneficiaries of the late James B. Holt was passed. Senator Hawley (Conn.) offered an amendment to the Sundry Civil bill appropriating \$50,000 to the beneficiaries of the late General Sheridan in recognition of the appreciation of the country of the valuable services rendered it by the late general.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The time was occupied in the Senate yesterday in discussing the Lullwater, Executive and Judicial Appropriation bill, the pending question being the amendment to increase the number of the Civil Service Commission, but no action was taken.

Wanting Legislative Aid.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 11.—An effort was presented in the form and in other sections to the lower House of the Kansas Legislature Friday from the National Anti-Horse Thieving Association at Kansas City, Mo. It is a bill to authorize the lynching of horse-thieves wherever they may be found and to limit the right of jury service to male adults.

Shaken Up by an Earthquake.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 11.—News comes from San Jacinto, a little mountain town in the extreme northern part of San Diego County, that an earthquake shook a few days ago so severely that a hall was broken up and 300 people sought safety by jumping through windows. Many were trampled under foot outdoors. Some cut by broken glass, but no one was fatally hurt.

Death of Thomas M. Nichol.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—Thomas M. Nichol, who was crippled several years ago as an advocate of coin currency and as a leader on political and financial subjects, died in the hospital here of spinal disease. He was 44 years old, and had been a helpless invalid for some years.

Gold Hunters Killed.

CHERRY, Wyo., Feb. 11.—A party of eight gold hunters were killed and their bodies found in a gulch near the town of Cherry, Wyo., on Monday. The party was on a search for gold in the mountains of the State.

Advocate of the State.

AGOSTINI, Feb. 11.—Ella Stevens, of Belgrade, this State, was given a reception by the Legislature yesterday in the hall of the House. Stevens is 101 years old, in good health, is the father of two sons, and a mother and a grandson of the war of 1812.

Denial.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 11.—The report that seventeen men were drowned in the lake, New York, proved to have been entirely unfounded.

Nine Lives Lost.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—A ferry-boat capsized at Pembroke Friday, throwing all on board into the water. Nineteen persons were drowned.
