# FROM WASHINGTON.

A Daily Record of Events in the Senate and House.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—A bill was passed in the Senate yesterday appropriating \$2.0,000 to enable the President to protect the interests of the United States and to provide for the security of the persons and property of citizens of the United States at the lathmus of Panama.

Washington, Feb. 13.—In the Senate yesterday the Naval Appropriation bill was further discussed and finally passed. A resolution was presented from the Kansas Legislature requesting Congress to adopt such measures as will secure to every citizen of the Southern States perfect protection in the exercise of all political rights.

Washington, Feb. 13.—In the Senate yesterday a bill was introduced providing that all citizens of the United States having the qualifications requisite for electors shall be entitled and allowed to vote at any election for Representative in the Congress of the United States without distinction of sex.

Mr. Evarta spoke in support of his resolution instructing the Committee on Elections to revise the laws governing Congressional elections. The nomination of Norman J. Column, of Missouri, to be Secretary of Agriculture was confirmed.

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Washington, Feb. 15.—A bill was reported in the States. The nomination of Carroll D. Wright to be Commissioner of Labor was confirmed.

Washington, Feb. 16. In the Senate yesterday a favorable report was made on the bill to provide for the establishment of a Kational Board of Health. The bill placing General Rosecrans on the retired list was passed, also forty-one private pension bills. A bill was introduced to provide for a National system of farmers' institutes.

Washingtons, Feb. 18.—A bill to place Major James Belger on the retired list as Colonel in the regular army was passed in the Senate on Baturday. The resolution concerning election outrages in Washington County, Tex, was considered.





FLOGGED IN PRISON.

den Watkins, and Tells Some Hard Things.

S. Donaldson, has filed his bill of of the Ionia House of Correction. It set forth that Johnson is 25 years old and a resident of Noble county, Ind.; that Watkins is warden of the prison at Ionia and has been for some time past; that one of the laws governing that institu-tion provides that no punishment shall be inflicted upon inmates by showering with cold water or whipping with a lash on the bare body nor any other brutal or inhuman punishment shall be allowed. On August 5, 1887, Johnson was an inmate of the prison and Wat-kins was warden; for some alleged in-traction of the rules the warden ordered the prisoner to be flogged with a strap-on the bare body. The order was given by the warden to G. B. Biair, a subordi-nate officer acting as deputy and the orone of the laws governing that instituon the bare body. The order was given by the warden to G. B. Blair, a subordinate officer acting as deputy and the order was carried out on the day named. The strap was of leather 24 inches long and three-quarters inches wide and one-quarter of an inch thick and was attached to a handle of wood 10 Inches in length. The flogging was done in the prison bath room, the victim being suspended, his arms fastened above his head with ropes attached to each wrist and his feet barely touched the floor, and his body was stripped from his knees to his arm pits. Twenty violent blows were given him during which he received injuries that incapacitated him from active life since. He was greatly hirt, bruised and wounded and has been sick and lame and disordered ever since the flogging was administered, and has suffered great pain and has been put to great exponse as a result of the crual punishment inflicted. Previous to August 5 he was a sound and healthy man, but now he suffers from atrophy of the lumbar muscles of the left side and leg and other evils, all the result of the injuries then sustamed, and he believes he is permanently crippled. His avocation before he became an inmate of the prison was that of a woodsman, working for wages cutting out trees for logs and lumber and was entirely dependent
