Labor, has acomitted to Congress a special report on marriages and discrees from 1807 to 1886. During the twenty years covered by the report there was a total of 28737 divorces granted in the Unite 1 States, increasing from 9 957 in 185. to 24, 37 in 1881. Of these 2.6.138 or 55 percent, were granted to sushands. The causes in which wives are the petitioners more largely than husbands are crueity, where the wife seeks divorce as 7 to 1; in descrition, where the projection is over 134 to 1; in drunkenness where it is 9 to 1. Descrition was given as the cause for 120, 37 divorces, and 66 63; were obtained on the ground of adultery. The commissioner says it is apparent that the divorces granted for drunkenness the total being 148 3 can not represent the total number in which drunkenness or intemperance is a serious factor.

A Terrible Snow-Storm in Chee Foo-Hundreds of Houses Burned in Japan. San Francisco, Feb. 23.—The China steamer which arrived Thursdry night brought news of a great snow-storm in Chee Foo. On February 3 a great fire broke oat in Shidmonki, Japan, extending down fourteen streets and destroyed (1400 houses, including temples schools and hospitals. On the following day fire at Yokosuka gutted 300 houses and barned to doath three men. On the same day ten houses were destroyed at Joshia and diffect at Tokio.




