WASHINGTON, March 12. The President sent the following nominations to the Sentate yesterday: Arthur C. Mellette, to be Governor of Dakota; George S. Batcheller, of New York, to be Assistant Secretary of the Treasury; Albert G. Porter, of Indiana, to be Minister to Italy; John A. Enander, of Illinois, to be Minister to Denmark; Samuel U. Chambers, to be United States District Attorney for Indiana; George W. Irwin, to be United States Marshal for Montana; C. H. Hanford, to be Chief Justice of Washington Territory. The nominations made on the previous day were confirmed. The standing committees were chosen.
Washington, March 14.—The following nominations were received by the Senat. From the President yesterday: Eugene Schüyler, of New York, to be Assistant Becuiary of State; Walker Blaine, of Maine, to be Assistant Secretary of the Interior. 




