Had the Indians been successful, all barriers of defence for the early settlers would have been overthrown and the deadly tomahawk would have been active in the rapid extermination of the remaining pioneers. On the other hand the fortunate termination of the contest put an end to further attempts to open warfare with the Indians. The rich territory, so long overrun by hostile savages, was thrown open for settlement, which rapidly occurred as soon as the news of the great victory became widespread.

He afterwards served as Commander of the Army of the Northwest, and when Indiana was admitted to statehood he was selected to represent the State in the United States Senate, In 1840 he was elected president and his unfortunate demise occurred shortly after being inaugnrated.


