CAPITAL NEWS.

A Short History of Events Transpiring at Washington.

Various Appointments Made by the President and Heads of Departments.—Other General Interest.

NATIONAL NEWS.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The Secretary of War has issued an order transferring by direction of the President, the State of Wisconsin from the Department of the East to the Department of Dakota.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Dr. J. H. Kilder, of the Smithsonian Institute, died at his residence in this city from an attack of pneumonia. Dr. Kilder served as a surgeon in the navy until he resigned in 1870, after 30 years ago since which time he has been connected with the scientific branch of the Government service.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Admiral C. Tanner, of Canton, O., has been appointed Chief of the Appointment Division of the Interior Department.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Secretary Hallford said Tuesday evening that the President had made no arrangements to leave Washington before the 19th of this month, when he goes to New York to attend the centennial celebration.

It is also stated that the Belgian Government will honor Stanley with a decoration and otherwise honoring Stanley.

The Failure Record.

NEW YORK, April 23.—The business failures occurring throughout the country during the last seven days, as reported by telegraph to R. G. Don & Co., the mercantile agency, number for the United States 215, and for Canada 37, or a total of 252, as against a total of 222 last week and 340 the week previous to the last. For the corresponding week of last year the figures were 225, made up of 230 failures in the United States and 20 in Canada.

Many Houses Burned.

CHIPPewa FALLS, Wis., April 23.—Fire broke out in an old shed here Saturday afternoon, and before it could be controlled spread among dwelling houses adjoining. The houses burned are those of O. Seavey, C. W. Pondrock, F. A. Rockard, George Hain and J. A. Sullivan. The entire loss is estimated at \$30,000. All parties affected succeeded in saving most of their household effects.

Dynamiters Guilty.

OSHTON, Ill., April 23.—The jury in the "O" dynamite case returned a verdict of guilty Saturday, fixing the punishment of Broderick at one year's imprisonment in the penitentiary and imposing a fine of \$500 on Godding. A motion for a new trial was entered by the defense. The defendants seemed to be satisfied with the verdict.

Naming Their Own Postmasters.

BOSTON, April 23.—A number of towns in Vermont are preparing to choose their postmasters by popular vote. The Republicans of Bradford, Marcellus and Sharon have already held caucuses to select candidates for the places held by Democratic postmasters, and will send the result of the election to President Harrison for his consideration.

Betrayed Their Trust.

FOUR TOWNSEND, W. T., April 23.—The United States grand jury yesterday found twenty-five indictments against William Harned, ex-Special Deputy Collector, eleven against Herbert E. Beecher, ex-Treasurer Agent, and twelve against Quincy A. Brooks, ex-Attorney from the Government. Beecher is a son of the late Henry Ward Beecher.

Important Decision.

St. Louis, April 23.—Thursday Judge Thayer decided that stealing papers from the top of a mail box was no more an offense against the mail laws than taking a package from the steps of the post-office.

Big Gas Wells at Findlay, O.

FINDLAY, O., April 23.—Two enormous gas wells were struck here Friday one with an capacity of over 10,000,000 cubic feet and the other with not less than 30,000,000 feet. The former is owned by the city.

ALL ARE SAFE.

The Steamer Missouri Rescues the Danish Ship's Passengers.

DELAWARE BREAKWATER, Del., April 23.—The steamer Missouri, which arrived here yesterday has on board 33 of the passengers and crew of the ill-fated Danish which was wrecked on the 19th inst. in mid-ocean, and the other 231 taken from the vessel were left at the Anvers.

The Danish was sighted by the Inman Line steamer City of Chester April 8 in latitude 46 degrees north and longitude 53 degrees west, four days after it was abandoned. The passengers of the Missouri will be given every attention by the Danish agents and forwarded to their destinations. Only steerage passengers have come on. The cabin passengers went to Lisbon, Spain, from the Anvers.

BURNED TO DEATH.

Three Men Lose Their Lives at a Fire in a Detroit Lodging-House.

DETROIT, Mich., April 23.—A fire at Deauville Hall, a cheap lodging-house at 43 and Cadillac squares, at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon, caused the death of three men and serious injury to a fourth. Malaki Powell, porter, let a lighted lamp fall from his hands in the rear of the bar-room, and in an almost incredible space of time the entire building was full of smoke. E. J. Gibson, a bartender, and T. J. Ballew were asleep on the third floor and both were suffocated. William Whittaker, a sailor, was seen at his window on the fourth floor, but before the firemen could reach him he fell back and was smothered. Powell was badly burned, but will probably recover.

MILLIONS LOST.

New York Villaged by One of the Fiercest Fires Ever Known.

NEW YORK, April 23.—The biggest and fiercest fire New York has witnessed in this generation swept the east bank of the North river clear Friday from Fifty-ninth street to what would be Sixty-fifth street if it were not for the fact that it destroyed more than 40,000 worth of property belonging to the New York Central railroad, and over \$1,000,000 worth of property owned by other persons. It is feared that four lives are lost.

TIGHTENING ITS GRIP.

The Standard Oil Company Gains Control of a Year Field in Ohio.

CLEVELAND, O., April 23.—The Standard Oil Company has completed a deal by which it gains control of the majority of the stock of the Ohio Oil Company. The territory acquired embraces 15,000 acres with a daily output of 5,000 barrels, virtually giving them control of the Ohio oil output. The Solar refinery at Lima, one of the largest in the country, comes into their possession.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 23.—The Sun's special from Norfolk, Va., says: A vessel went ashore Wednesday night near life-saving station No. 41, but as all on board were drowned before any assistance could reach them, and the vessel went to pieces shortly after she struck the beach, it has been impossible to ascertain her name, destination or cargo.

An Arful Tragedy.

BOSTON, April 23.—At West Farms, near Westfield, Mass., Thursday morning, Edgar King stole into his aged father's bedroom, killed him dead, and then tried to murder his two sons, falling in the process on the premises on fire and then killed himself. Insanity, growing out of disolute habits, is said to have been the cause of the tragedy.

Fell a Hundred and Seventy-Five Feet.

NICHOLAS FALLS, N. Y., April 23.—James Munda, an Italian workman employed on the new suspension bridge, fell 175 feet and fell in the water, 15 feet below. He rose to the surface and swam toward boats that put out from the shore for his rescue. This tank exhausted before he could be reached and was drowned.

License Wins at the Polls.

CHICAGO, April 23.—Municipal elections were held throughout the State yesterday. The results so far received show that the candidates in favor of liquor licenses were victorious in a majority of the towns.

STORM AND FLAME.

Miles of Country in Virginia Swept Over by Forest Fires—Kansas and Illinois Visited by Furious Wind-Storms.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 16.—The Sun's special from Danville, Va., says: A dispatch from Crittendon, on the Kanawha & New River railroad in Patrick County, Va., gives a graphic account of a devastating forest fire, extending from Patrick Springs to Crittendon, covering an area of ten miles long and three to six miles wide. The fire commenced on Friday afternoon and burned until a heavy rain aided the men in finally stopping it Sunday night.
