THOUSANDS STARVING.

A Terrible State of Affairs in the North Chinese Provinces.

Save Them from Famishing Cholera Finds Over One Thousand Victims In the Philippine Islands.

Baltimore, Md. April 16. The Sun's special from Danville Va, says A dispatch from Critz' depot, on the Danville A New River railroad in Patrick County, give a graphic account of a devastating frose fire, extending from Patrick Springs to Critz', covering an area of ten miles long and three to six miles wide. The fire commenced on Priday afternoon and burned until a heavy rain aided the men in finally stopping it on Sunday night. The flames, impelled by the gale, swept through the fortile valley called WRI Cat Hollow like a tornado, preceded by sounds like rolling thunder, and dashed up the mountain sides. MICHIGAN STATE NEWS.

The Prospects Said to Be Very Bright in the Upper Peninsula.

RAILWAY INTERESTS.

The Prospects Said to Be Very Bright in the Upper Peninsula.

"Railway interests in Northern Michigan are looking up," said ex-Mayor Nestor, of Marquette, recently. "We are opening up the country rapidly, and, if present indications are not wrong, it will not be long before we shall have for the first time direct communication with Chicago. We have built a great many miles of railway within the last four years in the Upper Peninsula—the 'Soo' Line, the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic, the Milwankee & Northern, the Milwankee, Lake Shore & Western, and some considerable extension to the Chicago & Northwestern system—in all over one thousand miles—which open up territory rich in minerals. The latest project is a line from Marquette to Champion, the present terminus of the M. & N. The new road takes a northwesterly course up the valley of the dead River from Marquette, and after getting out about ten miles on the river, to Upper Palls, strikes off to the west and the towns of Negamee and Ishpeming, thence on in the same direction to the Champion mines. The disjance is about thirty-five miles. The upper falls have always been an impediment to the rafting of lumber; consequently the road will naturally get the carrying of some five hundred million feet of pine and yeast quantities of other timber from the upper branches of the river. Besides this it runs through rich timber belts nearly all the way to Negamee and opens up a distinctively new mineral range lying north of the present developed one.




