JEFFERSON CITY, M9., April 29.—The bill to prohibit the buying and selling of agricultural products and stocks and bonds for fature delivery, known as the Grain Gambling act, has passed both houses of the General Assembly and is now in the hands of the Governor for his signature. This bill makes all option business unlawful, and if it is signed and enforced the big Merchants Exchange in this city will have to close its doors. The punishment for a violation of the law is a fine of from \$330 to \$5,000.

Crops Reported in an Excellent Condition, and Large Yielus Expected.

Collinary, O., April 27.—Hon. Lee Weltz, an excellent authority on crops and fruits, has made an extended tour of inspection of Ohio, and gives a glowing account of their conditions at the present time. He says that thousands of acres of corn have been planted and that wheat is looking excellent, and the yield promises to be far above the average. The indications are that there will be an over-abundance of all kinds. The season is sufficiently advanced to assure this result, unless there is some extraordinary occurrence to destroy the crop. 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
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
