The Inauguration of George Washington as President Celebrated.

Fork Has the Greatest of Moder lary Parades; Also a Notable Hau-quet and Ball-The Day in

IN NEW TORE.

ELIZARETH, N. J., April 32.—The centennial celebration in commemoration of the finauguration of the first President of the United States may be said to have commenced here with the arrival of President Harrison at 7:25 a. in. On the 22d of April 103 years ago General Washington arrived here (the place was then called Elizabethtown after a tedious journey of six days from Washington. This time President Harrison, so great is the contrast in means of transportation wrought by a

straments. Arriving at the Aleyone boat house the President and Vice-President were rowed out to the Dispatch in a bargo manned by twelve United States seamen. The rest of the Presidential party were taken out in a steam launch. The President boarded the Dispatch at 10:40, and a few moments later she steamed up the Kill von Kall on her way to New York. New York, April 30.—On the arrival of the Dispatch in the East river at the foot of Wall street a harge manned by a crew of ship-insaters from the Marine Society of the port of New York, with Captain Ambrose thow, president of that society, as cox-swain, put out to meet her and row the President above. The crew of the barge that rowed President Washington from Elizabethport to the foot of Wall street were members of the same society. Captain Snow's crew consisted of James Harding, William B. Depew de-Hvering the oration, in which he detailed the virtues of Washington and praised the characteristics of his fellow workmen in liberty's cause. President Harrison also epoke briefly.

Nearly every State and Territory in the Union was represented in the parade. Close estimates make the number of militiamen in line 23,000. This great body was followed by 10,000 or more Grand Army veterans.

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

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
