# MICHIGAN STATE NEWS.

THE STATE PIONEERS.

Fifteenth Annual Session of the Pioneer and Historical Society.

The fifteenth annual session of the State Pioneer and Historical Society was held recently at Lansing. Puring the past year there were twenty five deaths in the society, the total years represented in the deaths being 1,802 an average of 75 years. The list also contained a number of centenariana, among whom were Mrs. Susan Conway, at 103 years and 7 months; Armistead Fielding, a nutive of Scotiand, at 110 years i month and 20 days; Elizabeth Harger, Germany, at 101 years and 3 months. Alexander Odrin, who died in California, Branch County, July 10, 1888, was, without doubt, the first native white child born in Michligan and had quite a stirring career. He was a Frenchman, born in Detroit October 17, 1791, married in 1814, and died at the good of 97, leaving a widow uged 94, and 9 children out of 13 born to them. He remembered when the city of Detroit was about sixty rods square, enclosed by a stockade except at the river front, and every third post of the stockade loopholed for a rifle.

A Town Built on a Cave.

The residents of St. Ignace are highly elated and greatly excited over the discovery that that town rests upon a cave. The mouth of the cave is under the bluff where the new cemetery is located. It is just large enough to admit a man's body. It goes down at an angle of about forty-five degrees and then takes a straight descent. At the bottom of the shaft one can step into the first cavern.

A Monument Dedicated.

The monument stands three miles east of the town, where the Michigan cavairy under Gregg and Custer met and defeated the attempt of Stuart and Wade Hampton to get in the rear of the Union lines. 
