WAS HE MURDERED?

Dr. McInerny, of New York, Belleved to Mave Met Cronin's Fate.

New York, July I.—The Herald in a twocolumn article calls attention to the fact that Dr. John McInerny, one of the four men who are alleged to have been doomed to death by the inner circle of the Clan-naGael, is missing still, and intimates that he was killed before Cronin was Shortly before he was tax seen, in the middle of April, he received at the Oatholic protectory a telegram from Omaha offering him a good position if he would come there immediately to take it. It is assumed that he started for Omaha in time to have arrived in Chicago en route would come there immediately to take it its assumed that he started for Omaha in time to have arrived in Chicago en route on April 21. His friends in New York have written to Omaha to inquire about the telegram; and the alleged position awaiting him, and have received replies that after diligent inquiry no one could be found who was interested in McInerny's going; to Omaha, nor had be been seen there. John Devoy, who was McInerny's associate in the Irish Nation, believes McInerny was lured to his death by the telegram. All agree that there is just as good ground for believing that McInerny was assassinated as for the assertion that Cronin was siain by the inner circle of the Clan-ua-Gael, which had doomed Cronin, McInerny, Devoy and Dr. McCahey, of Philadelphia, to death. There is evidence to show that traps were laid for McCahey, just like those that at first failed with Cronin, and Devoy has been openly threstened, and men have watched his movements, not knowing that their own movements were also watched.

The battle which gave the Menominees the ascendancy arose out of a dispute over the right of the Menominees to catch sturgeon at the mouth of the river before they could reach the Chippewas who were located further up the river.




