

FROM WASHINGTON.

Items of General Interest from the National Capital. The Persian Minister Resigns Because of Newspaper Comment—The President Returns from His Trip to Connecticut—Other Notes.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—Frederick Douglas called on the President Tuesday to thank him for his appointment as Minister to Haiti, and to recommend Charles S. Morris for Minister to Liberia. Mr. Morris is recommended for this place by General Alger, of Michigan; General Bradley, of Kentucky; General Knapp, of New York, and by several State delegations besides that of Kentucky. It is expected that he will get the appointment.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—The present indebtedness of the District of Columbia is \$1,420,000, a decrease of \$1,050,000 since July, 1888.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—Secretary Bunk has issued a circular to railroad agents and managers notifying them that Texas fever exists among cattle in portions of Arkansas, Indian Territory and Texas. The circular gives instructions for isolating infected cattle during transportation and for disinfecting cars after they have been unloaded. Inspectors are to be located at all principal stock points in the country to see that the provisions of the circular are enforced.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—Haji Haseen Ghoochy Khan, the Persian Minister to the United States, has received word that he will soon leave this country, he says, to return. He gives as his reason the fact that he is desirous of returning to Persia from time to time concerning the ways and doings of his royal master, the Shah.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—The Secretary of the Treasury has under consideration the case of twenty-five English glass-blowers who landed at Boston April 12, and subsequently secured employment with Messrs. McKee & Co. in Lowell, Mass. It is charged that these men were brought over by the Universal Federation of Glass Workers in violation of the alien contract-labor law.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The President returned at 9:25 Saturday night from Woodstock. He was accompanied by Secretary Tracy. He was met at the station by Private Secretary Halford, with whom he drove to the White House.

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TO FOUND AN IRISH REPUBLIC.

A Movement to Establish One in Canada, Chili, Peru or Mexico. Chicago.—A number of prominent Irish-Americans held a private meeting Thursday afternoon at the Grand Pacific to discuss the feasibility of organizing an Irish-American Republic to advance the interests of Ireland and the Irish race.

It is the intention of the projectors of the above-named association to organize a land syndicate, composed of industrial and wealthy Irishmen, and representatives to Canada, Chili, Peru and Mexico. The latter country, it is understood, would be willing to dispose of Lower California or a neighboring State, under certain conditions, with the privilege of establishing an Irish-American republic therein.

It is proposed to secure a grant of land there, or elsewhere, sufficient to accommodate from 2,000,000 to 10,000,000 of people, and divert the enormous immigration pouring into this country from Ireland to this land, erect improvements on the same, and furnish immigrants with necessary tools and implements. The money required for this purpose is to be raised by mortgage, without interest or at a very low rate, and collected in small annual installments, the same as rent. This money will be utilized to build and equip a navy, organize an army, drive off the resources of the country, and establish a republic.
