The room presented a terrible sight, with walls and ceilings, bed and floor all bespattered with 5.001. At first suspicion rested upon a cousin as the perpetrator of the crime, based principally upon evidence given before the coroner's jury by the new self-confessed murderer.

To Judge Hatch Wesley Elkins related the story of the crime. He had had some difficulty with his father. The night of the murder he slept in the barn. Between 2 and 3 o'clock he got up and went into the house and took dawn arife which was hanging in the kitchen, loaded it and went into the room where his father, mother and sister were sleeping. "I placed the murrie of the r fie for my father's bead and sent a builet through his brain. This frightened my mother and she arose and I, knowing that I was discovered, went into the kitchen, seized a club, went back into the bedroom, and killed my mother. I staid around the house about thrity minutes, then desided to arouse the neighbors. I took the baby from the bed, where it lay between its dead mother and father, took it into the adjoining bedroom, removed its blood-stained clothing, and with it in my arms went to a neighbor's and related the crime that had been committed, but antelled myself. I am guitty of the crime."

THE YOUNG MAN WHO BEAT THE PASHA FIFTY YEARS AGO.

On a summer afternoon, almost fifty years ago, Sulejmann Pasha, commander-in-chief of the Egyptian artillery, sat at coffee in a cafe on the Nile terrace in Cairo. At tables near him were many soldiers who had helped him fight the armies of Sultan Mahmud not many months before. Several of them had been with him in the battle of Nizib, when he routed the Turkish army under Hafiz Pasha and Col. von Moltke, then in the sultan's service. 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
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
