BIT THE DUST.

Wad-El-N'jumi, the Rebel Leader, Among the Killed - Many Prisoners Taken-General Grenfell's Relentless Onslaught Ends the War.

SLAUGHTER IN SOTPT.

LONDON, Ang. & —A bettle was fought in Egypt Saturday which practically ends the war unless a new leader shall arise and gather the flying dervishes. Wad-el-Njumi, twelve of his emirs, and 1,500 dervishes were killed, while the Egyptian loss is insignificant. For several weeks the two armies have been gradually approaching each other, and the daily dispatches indicate that a declave engagement could not long be delayed. Several skirmishes took piace Welnesday. Thursday and Friday in which small parties of dervishes we're compelled to retreat with considerable loses, while the Egyptians in each case came off with none killed and few wounded. General Grenfell held a council with his efficers Friday night, and it was decided to force the fighting. Early Saturday morning the Egyptian troops were massed for action pear Took, under cover of the darkness, and the advance upon the dervishes bean. The robis meantime learned of Grenfell's movements, but received the warning too late to make an effective re-istance. The Egyptian council was effective re-istance. but received the warning too late to make an effective re-istance. The Egyptian coi-nms advanced on the double quick, re-serving their fire until they wer within

short range, when they opened with a
deadly voltey all along the line. The dervishes fought very stabbornly and refused
quarter. They attempted to turn the extreme right of the Egyptians when the
cavalry awept through the enemy's lines,
sabering them right and left.
Hundreds of the rebels fell and the remainder soon broke and ran. Wad-elN'jumi, their leader, succeeded in railying
them in a grove, where they awaited the
oncouning of the attacking army. Grenfell's
troops again advanced on the double quick,
and when within 20 yards of the grove
fired a second voltey, which dislodged the robels and sent thum
flying southward. The Egyptians pursued the rebels three miles, loading and firing at short intervals with terrible effect. Wad-el-N'jumi and seven of
his emirs were found dead in the grove.
Five more enirs were killed during the
pursuit. No prisoners are renorted to have
been taken as yet. The dervishes dead are
roughly estimated at 1.300. The gunboats
have been ordered to pick up the wounded
and fugitives. and fugitives.

Camo, Aug. 5.—General Grenfell, in his official report of Saturday's battle, says that the dervishes made repeated and desperate charges upon his men. They were met by the infantry in line of battle, supported by the Twenty-fourth Hussars and the Egyptian cavalry. The Egyptian horse artillery did excellent service. The dervishes numbered 3,000 fighting men. The latest advices give the Egyptian iose as seventeen killed and 131 wounded. One thousand dervishes were made prisoners.






